Proposed on-site sewage (septic) system code revision update to come before the Board in November

The On-site Sewage System (OSS) Program in Environmental Health Services has been gathering input since May 2025 from community members and other partners impacted by OSS codes. The primary goals expressed in these conversations were to reduce costs associated with OSS permitting and failure replacements, remove barriers to independent property management, and align codes with specific public health risks. The Program has drafted proposed code revisions that aim to address these goals. The draft proposed changes were made publicly available on September 18. The OSS Program has hosted six public comment meetings across King County, and public comments can be submitted via email, phone, mail, and survey through October 21. The Program will review all public comments and include an explanation of how they were addressed in the November Board of Health meeting packet, which you will receive on November 14.

King County's 100 Days of Action on Gun Violence Prevention

This week concludes King County's 100 Days of Action, but the work is far from over. Throughout the 100 Days of Action, the Public Health – Seattle & King County Regional Office

of Gun Violence Prevention (ROGVP) has catalyzed ongoing action that focuses attention, raises awareness, amplifies solutions, galvanizes support and increases commitments toward shared strategies for long term change. As the 100 Days of Action concludes, the ROGVP team will work on a final 100 Days of Action Report which will outline outcome, and launch a collaborative 12-month strategic planning process to develop a 5-year strategic plan to reduce gun violence in King County.

New StoryMap highlights COVID-19 Recovery Indoor Air Program

Public Health's Environmental Health Services (EHS) Division has published a new StoryMap highlighting the COVID-19 Recovery Indoor Air Program. From 2021 to 2024, we assisted over 3,000 facilities, carried out multilingual outreach, and distributed over 8,500 portable High-Efficiency Particulate Air (HEPA) air cleaners and over 4,500 box fan filter kits with MERV13 filters. This multipronged approach was invaluable in restoring health, comfort, and peace of mind to residents. The StoryMap outlines the program's lessons learned, outcomes, and recommendations, and includes an interactive map showing the number of sites served and number of portable HEPA air cleaners distributed by the team and partners.

Meat cutters license update

Part of Public Health's food safety responsibilities includes issuing meat cutter licenses. Anyone who cuts fresh beef, veal, lamb, and/or pork within a King County meat establishment is required to obtain an annual occupational Meat Cutter license, which requires applicants to study and pass a Meat Cutter exam.

The Meat Cutter exam checks for basic skills of meat cutting, handling, care, and knowledge of sanitation and code requirements, and Public Health provides study guides. In order to meet the needs of smaller shops, this summer Public Health began offering two types of exams, instead of just one. One exam is for those employed at a supermarket with 40 or more employees, and a second is for those at shops with fewer than 40 employees, which includes Halal Meat Markets and Kosher Meat Markets.

Public Health is reaching out to all meat markets to explain the new licensing procedure. Meat handlers will have until March 31,2025 to schedule and obtain their meat cutters license.

Pet business update

Public Health's <u>Pet Business Program</u> permits and inspects more than 500 pet businesses such as groomers, day cares and kennels to keep pets safe and prevent the spread of disease. You may recall that earlier this year some residents shared with the Board their concerns about pet businesses with suspended licenses. I'm pleased to report that Public Health has launched a <u>new webpage</u> and newsletter to inform people about pet businesses that have suspended permits.

Now, you can sign up to receive email alerts when Public Health suspends a business's Public Health permit. To raise awareness about these new resources, Public Health conducted outreach to media and concerned constituents and promoted the materials on social media.
