SUBJECT

Today's panel discussion will focus on planning for the 2026 FIFA World Cup events.

SUMMARY

The 2026 FIFA World Cup will take place from June 11 to July 19, 2026. It will be hosted by 16 cities in the United States, Canda, and Mexico. A total of 48 teams will participate.

Seattle is one of the host cities, with six matches between June 15 and July 6 at Seattle Stadium (aka Lumen Field), as well as nine events at Seattle Center. The FIFA Seattle Organizing Committee (Seattle FWC) has been coordinating with Metro, Sound Transit, and local jurisdictions to coordinate transit and transportation planning for the FIFA events.

At today's meeting, representatives from the Seattle Organizing Committee, Metro, and Sound Transit will discuss planning activities to date.

- **Likely not open to public**, still may see crowds of people outside depending on team

Proposed Team Base Camps (PTBC)

Renton: Sounders FC Clubhouse

Spokane: Gonzaga University

- Team's "home away from home"
- Not confirmed: 60+ proposed, need 48
- Will be chosen in Feb/Mar 2026
- **Teams arrive** late May/early June, stay at least through Group Stage (June 27)
- **Likely not open to public,** still may see crowds depending on team 2025

APPROACH TO FWC26 MOBILITY



Planning Principles

- Ensure safe & seamless event transport while maintaining mobility
- Utilize existing groups / structures
- Values + Safety protocols means we are aiming to maximize transit & active options (target: 80% match day by non-private vehicle)
- Communicate early & often using standard channels + FWC26 specific opportunities: FIFA app, international

Planning Timeline

- <u>Summer</u>: **develop** plans for transit, rideshare, biking/pedestrian, communications messaging
- <u>Fall</u>: **refine** plans based on agencies & community input, and the confirmed days of planned operation
- <u>December</u>: **finalize** plans based on schedule from tournament draw
- April/May: begin Know Before You Go public education campaigns



World Cup In Context




Focus

- King County Metro provides critical mobility to special events as a local and regional service provider
- More people are looking at transit for travel to events
- FIFA Men's World Cup presents both a unique **challenge and opportunity**. While World Cup will entail unavoidable impacts to Metro's service, it will also be an opportunity to introduce transit to new riders, and to position **public transit as a premier mobility solution**.

Why are people using transit?





Lessons Learned from Previous Events & Peer Agencies

- Adding service vs the burden it places on operations
- Custom special service must be communicated early and clearly
- Queuing and Stadium Station overload
- Mitigation strategies
 - Use both scheduled and standby services
 - Downtown shuttle for very large events
- Dedicate more resource to advance planning




Our current system has capacity for more riders



Ambassadors

- Staff ambassadors at key
 1 Line stations supporting riders
- Contracted ambassadors supporting elevator use at 1 Line stations near Lumen Field
- Fare Ambassadors provide post-game customer support at IDS



Facilities

- Sound Transit and KCM facilities staff supporting stations near Lumen Field and Downtown Seattle. Oncall for rest of the system.
- Elevator/Escalator techs roaming 1 Line system to address issues real-time for weekday games. Techs on call for weekend games.



Security

- Contracted security and law enforcement focus on 1 Line stations near Lumen Field
- Mobile patrols onboard 1 Line trains in Downtown Seattle

2025 Station Activation Pilot

- Goals: 1) Celebrate the people in the neighborhood, 2) pilot potential activation strategy for
 2026 World Cup, 3) Promote ridership connections, 4) Enhance passenger flow for large events
- Partnership with Chinatown / International District Business Improvement District (CIDBIA) and Alliance for Pioneer Square to activate IDS / Union Station Plaza and Pioneer Square
- Activities include, neighborhood information booths, DJs / music, digital passport and more!



- Additional service scenarios developed once Tacoma Fan Zone details are available

ST Express

- No changes to ST Express service until after World Cup
- Additional midday and evening service scenarios developed once 2026 schedule is released

Sounder

- High-level conversations with BNSF on additional round trips
- Leverage 2025 schedule pilot results to refine 2026 approach, once 2026 schedule is released

Additional Support for FIFA World Cup 26



Charters

- RFP to procure temporary charter bus support
- Leveraged for system capacity and/or for disruptions
- Deployment coordinated with operating and regional partners



Bus Refurbishment

- Refurbishing ST Express buses to extend useful life
- Buses leveraged for system capacity and/or for disruptions
- Buses could be leveraged by Stride Operations post-FIFA World Cup 26

Next Steps

- Continue deploying plans for FIFA Club World Cup 2025
- Facilitate lessons learned process for FIFA Club World Cup 2025 this summer
- Continue to work with LOC and other partners to align regional strategies for FIFA World Cup 26
- Prepare for next Board briefing in Q3
