MOTION NO.

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 A MOTION stating Council policy regarding sponsorship of criminal offender detention and rehabilitation facilities; requesting the Executive to analyze the feasiblity of the county's constructing a new correctional facility.

WHEREAS, the Department of Rehabilitative Services is responsible for detention of prisoners sentenced to the King County Jail, and

WHEREAS, the Department of Rehabilitative Services is responsible to administer various prisoner rehabilitative programs within its principal function of detention, and

WHEREAS, the King County Jail maintains an average daily population of over six hundred prisoners in varying status of detention, and

WHEREAS, the State Courts and the Department of Social and Health Services are more and more emphasizing the concept of community based corrections, and

WHEREAS, current state correctional facilities are over-crowded resulting in the housing of criminal offenders within facilities lacking diagnostic and rehabilitative services by virtue of their geographic location, and

WHEREAS, King County is not opposed to the concept of community based corrections when planning and the funding of community programs represents a coordinated effort on the part of the state and local jurisdictions, and

WHEREAS, to expand services in the field of corrections in King County would require additional facilities as the present space is being used to capacity and is inadequate for the purpose of incorporating acceptable design and program standards deemed appropriate for modern detention and rehabilitation programs, and

WHEREAS, legislation, Fourth Substitute House Bill No. 93, is currently being discussed on the state level which would

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provide local jurisdictions with funds for the capital construction of correctional facilities, and

WHEREAS, legislation currently being discussed would strongly encourage multi-jurisdictional cooperations and consolidation of present correctional services, and

WHEREAS, King County should play a leading role in advancing the concept of community based corrections through advocating the construction of a multi-purpose facility capable of providing detention and rehabilitation services, and

WHEREAS, the construction of a multi-purpose correctional facility by King County within an urban setting would provide the most logical base to link other governmental services with criminal offender rehabilitation programs involving work-release, job development, counseling and related social services, and

WHEREAS, the construction of a regional corrections facility would provide a unique opportunity for King County to coordinate planning with designated state agencies in providing rehabilitative services to state maintained criminal offenders prior to their release from state institutions, services to criminal offenders who will be returning to King County upon release, and

WHEREAS, a regional corrections facility offers participating jurisdictions the opportunity for reducing present operating costs through consolidation of services.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

The Council endorses and requests passage of state legislation, Fourth Substitute House Bill No. 93, now being discussed which would provide local jurisdictions funds to construct new and expanded correctional facilities.

The Council requests that the Executive join with the Council in urging the passage of proposed legislation by the Washington State Legislature.

The Executive is requested to study the feasibility of the County's constructing a regional corrections and criminal offender

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rehabilitation facility. The feasibility study to examine the concept of multi-jurisdictional participation, potential costs, methods of financing, potential services and the mix of such services as compared to a potential level of criminal population.

It is the intent of the Council that an examination of the feasiblity of constructing such a facility at this time would provide the county the flexibility to quickly react to changes in or the passage of funding legislation now being discussed by the Washington State Legislature.

SUBJECT: Regional Based Detention Facilities

Dear Mr. Spellman:

In regular session on August 16, 1976, the Council passed Proposed Motion #76-612 requesting your support of state legislation, Fourth Substitute House Bill No. 93, which would provide local jurisdictions with funds for the capital construction of correctional facilities. The Motion also requests that a study be undertaken by the County Executive to ascertain the feasibility of the County's constructing a regional rehabilitation facility. Such a study should examine: potential for multi-jurisdictional participation; costs; 3) methods of financing; 4) potential services; and 5) the mix of potential services compared to a potential level of criminal population.

The crowding at the King County Jail and at this state's major penetentiaries could be eased by the construction of regional based facilities located within major urban areas. Such facilities would enhance rehabilitation by being located where inmates on work release programs would have greater opportunities for employment.

The Council recognizes that the request for a feasibility study will impact your staff, and has set aside time at the Public Utilities and Facilities Committee meeting of August 23, 1976 for you or your representative to present an approach for conducting the study.
