MOTION NO. 5382

A MOTION authorizing the Director of Public Works to take actions necessary to conduct a study related to the formation of a Surface Water Utility.

WHEREAS, King County has significant surface water management responsibilities, and

WHEREAS, the County Council has determined there is a need for finding a stable means of financing the growing needs for surface water management in King County and for establishing management controls to assure that services are provided as efficiently and effectively as possible, and

WHEREAS, preliminary studies indicate that a Surface Water
Utility may be the most practical and feasible means of providing
for the comprehensive management and administration of stormwater
and erosion control, and

WHEREAS, a detailed study is needed to consider alternatives for the establishment of the Utility as well as the establishment of a rate structure for service charges;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

- A. The Director of Public Works shall conduct a study for the purpose of forming a County-wide Surface Water Utility.
- B. The study shall propose alternatives for the establishment of a Surface Water Utility. In general, the study shall:
  - 1. Determine the role of a Surface Water Utility and its relationship to other jurisdictions.
  - 2. Specifically, identify the possibilities and limitations of using various statutes for establishing the Utility.
  - 3. Provide recommendations regarding the organizational frameworks of the Utility.
  - 4. Describe the administrative responsibilities of the Utility, particularly, the procedures for the collection, administration, and disposition of

revenues. Alternative billing methods should be reviewed.

- 5. Provide a detailed operating budget for the first year of implementation.
- C. The study shall consider possible rate structures for the Utility. The study shall be based on the following:
  - Rate structures shall be developed which clearly identify the elements of cost by major functions performed by the Utility and by major work products of the Utility.
  - 2. The issue of who pays for service charges shall be based on alternative approaches to rate setting. There shall be an equitable allocation of rates and charges, to the extent feasible, to those who benefit from the functions provided by the Surface Water Utility and to those who contribute to the costs of those functions.
  - Each alternative approach to rate setting shall include an estimate of potential revenues.
  - 4. Alternatives for service areas shall be described in detail.
  - 5. Alternative schedules for implementation of service rates and charges, ranging from one-time County-wide implementation to sub-basin by sub-basin implementation, shall be considered.
  - 6. Policy and assumptions underlying the rate structure should be consistent between drainage basin and sub-basin areas.
  - 7. Rates and charges shall take into account full reimbursement to the Utility for services rendered to cities, towns, and special districts based upon interlocal cooperative agreements. Fixed costs shall

be spread to the maximum extent possible through broadening the service area to other jurisdictions within King County that desire the service.

- 8. Rate structures shall be developed in a fashion which minimizes the cost of administration and collection of fees and charges.
- 9. All potential revenue sources shall be reviewed and considered with the intent of minimizing ongoing service charge amounts. Such revenue sources should include general obligation bonds and revenue bonds for financing of needed capital developments, service charges, development fees, cost reimbursements based on interlocal agreements, State and Federal funding, and the revenues of current County functions that would be assumed by the Surface Water Utility.
- D. A range of alternatives shall be considered for financing capital improvements including but not limited to, State and Federal grants, voter-approved general obligation bonds and revenue bonds.
- E. The study shall include a plan for conducting a major County-wide public information program aimed at developing:
  - 1. Public awareness of surface water management problems and needs.
  - Public support for the establishment of a Surface Water Utility and basic financing alternatives including service charges.
