A MOTION authorizing the Seattle-King County department of public health to expend Robert Wood Johnson grant funds pursuant to council proviso in Ordinance No. 7864.

WHEREAS, the Seattle-King County department of public health has been awarded a four-year, \$1.4 million grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation for the Seattle-King County Comprehensive AIDS Service Project, to develop a comprehensive health and support services system for persons with AIDS (PWAs) or disabling AIDS-related conditions (D-ARCs), and

WHEREAS, \$378,412 of Robert Wood Johnson Foundation funds have been appropriated to the department for 1987, and

WHEREAS, a 1987 budget proviso in Ordinance No. 7864 provides that "the \$378,412 designated as the first year's portion of the four-year Robert Wood Johnson Foundation AIDS Program grant shall be expended following approval by council motion having reviewed the executive's recommendation stating the goals of the grant award, and the work program for 1987, including line item budget detail and its relation to measurable management objectives", and

WHEREAS, the Seattle-King County department of public health and its subcontractors would use the \$1.4 million grant over the four-year period of January 1987 through December 1990 to support "four lead community service and volunteer organizations in recruitment, training, and supervision of volunteers, new program development, and resource development"; strengthen the ambulatory and inpatient/outpatient case management programs for PWAs and D-ARCs at area hospitals; foster "changes in public assistance regulations and eligibility criteria to better meet the needs of PWAs and D-ARCs"; and create "AIDS-specific long-term care, services and/or facility and residences of last resort", and

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WHEREAS, the success of the four-year project is contingent upon several key policy assumptions, which include that 1) the department will be the lead agency for development of a continuum of care; 2) the timely development of a three-year plan for meeting the heatlh and support service needs of PWAs and D-ARCs which will serve as the base document for developing the continuum of care; 3) components of a continuum of care will be in place as scheduled; 4) subcontracting agencies will successfully develop and maintain volunteers sufficient to deliver contracted services; 5) King County's future funding liability will be minimized by ensuring that the system of care will approach financial self-sufficiency at the end of the grant period based on changes to public assistance programs; and

WHEREAS, the executive has not provided an AIDS services plan which justifies proposed goals, quantifies client needs and existing system inadequacy, discusses the relative priority of service needs, and the costs, benefits, and implications of alternative strategies, thereby providing the council a basis for evaluating the appropriateness of grant activities and the need for policy guidance, and

WHEREAS, while the grant application and workplan contain target dates for opening AIDS residences and, opening a long-term care facility, activities which have potentially significant policy and financial implications, the executive has not provided specific details of the components' forms, nor the anticipated county role in developing, financing, and operating them, and

WHEREAS, specific policies governing county service to PWAs and D-ARCs relative to other health and human service needs do not exist, the council, as the "policy determining body of the county"

has an interest in assessing the need for and developing policy to guide and control impacts of future programmatic and financial developments relative to AIDS programs, and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

- A. The Seattle-King County department of public health is hereby authorized to expend the \$378,412 in Robert Wood Johnson Foundation funds appropriated for 1987 for the purposes of 1) fostering changes to public assistance regulations and eligibility for PWAs and D-ARCs; 2) expanding ambulatory and case management services; 3) strengthening volunteer networks that serve PWAs and D-ARCs; 4) providing grant funded attendant care; 5) developing a management information system to support program evaluation and the grantor's information needs; and 6) documenting thoroughly client needs, system inadequacies, and the strategies possible to address inadequacies in a continuum of care.
 - B. The King County executive is directed to:
- 1. Provide by March 1, 1987, for council review and approval by motion, the housing feasibility study for persons with AIDS, which was funded by the City of Seattle and due to be completed in January 1987. At the same time the Seattle-King County department of public health will provide a schedule and plan for completing a "three year comprehensive AIDS service plan", and for submitting it for council review and approval.
- 2. Include the following information for each component of the "three year comprehensive plan": a) documentation of present and projected client needs for a service; b) the qualitative and quantitative inadequacies of existing services; c) present number of PWAs and D-ARCs having private insurance, other financial resources, public assistance or no resources to obtain the service when available; d) the range of options to address the needs i.e., type of service, potential providers, financing options; e) the costs,

benefits, and policy implications of the options; and f) how this need ranks in importance compared to other needs of PWAs and D-ARCs.

- 3. Provide to the council quarterly reports prepared by subcontracting agencies and the department, including the demographic data sheet, narrative describing progress toward project goals, and other instruments as may be developed for reporting to the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation or the department. The department's regional division director will brief the council committee having oversight responsibility for the department on project status at the first committee meeting of May, August, November, and February of each grant year (excluding February 1987).
- C. Pending council review and approval by motion of the housing feasibility study covering residential long term care facilities, the council does not authorize expenditure of Robert Wood Johnson Foundation funds for the facilities.
- D. The council expects that work products requested above will be provided well in advance of any discussion of 1988 appropriations for the Seattle-King County Comprehensive Aids Service Project funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation grant.
