

MOTION NO. 7621

A MOTION establishing a neighborhood traffic safety program, requesting the departments of public safety and public works to combine their resources to acquire and maintain a portable radar unit and readerboard, and to make such equipment available to interested community groups and individuals.

WHEREAS, the King County council recognizes that speeding vehicles are a threat to the safety and welfare of residential communities, and

WHEREAS, the King County council desires to enhance responsiveness to neighborhood speeding concerns, and

WHEREAS, the King County council desires to implement a neighborhood speed reduction program, and

WHEREAS, such a speed reduction program incorporates the interest and participation of interested communities and citizens, and

WHEREAS, the King County council recognizes the need to acquire such effective tools as radar and readerboards to effectively provide for this task;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

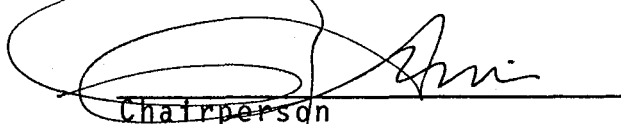
A. The county executive shall direct the sheriff-director of the Department of Public Safety to utilize the resources of the Department of Public Works to provide for the purchase of necessary equipment; and further, shall direct the Sheriff of King County to implement this program by September 1, 1989.

B. The Executive shall direct the sheriff to present to the council no later than February 1, 1989 a report on the efficacy of the neighborhood traffic safety program, which report shall include, at the minimum: the process used to engender public involvement, numbers of citizens who have volunteered, amounts of time volunteered, sites selected for initial implementation, final program design, staffing, costs

1 associated with all aspects of implementation, results of the
2 program, and recommendations for future initiatives.
