MOTION NO. 7656

A MOTION approving the 1989 King County Plan for Adult Mental Health Services and authorizing the County executive to transmit the plan to the State of Washington Department of Social and Health Services.

WHEREAS, in Motion 7564, the King County council requested the county executive to prepare and submit, by June 30, 1989, for council review and adoption, a mental health plan consistent with the 1989 Mental Health Reform Act, and

WHEREAS, Motion 7564 directed that the plan describe how a new system of mental health services will be organized, funded, and operated for the benefit of mentally ill persons in King County, including details of the sequence of events that will occur over the next three state biennia to transform the existing system into the new system, and

WHEREAS, the department of human resources has conducted an 18-month public process, including broad representation from consumers, providers, and family advocates, to review and propose reorganizing King County's system of mental health services for adults and has developed and submitted to the council the June, 1989 plan entitled "King County's Plan for Adult Mental Health Services: A New Direction," and

WHEREAS, the plan includes provision for a children's mental health coordinator and development of a children's system plan.

WHEREAS, the plan is intended to serve as the basis for the county's statement of intent to become a Regional Support Network under the new law and apply for the new funds provided by the Legislature for that purpose, and

WHEREAS, the 1989-91 state appropriation for Regional Support Network Development was based on projections from King and Snohomish Counties and the plan is based on the same projection of \$13.85 million of additional funding for King County.

WHEREAS, the plan is due to the state by October 30, 1989. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

A. The June, 1989 plan entitled "Adult Mental Health Services: A New Direction" is hereby approved as King County's statement of intent, along with the following clarifications, changes and additions:

1. Plan Title.

The title of the plan shall be changed to "King County's Plan for Mental Health Services: A New Direction" to recognize the inclusion of children's mental health.

1989-91 Biennium Budget.

The Council recognizes the following budget and allocation plan will be refined over the course of the next several months as greater and greater levels of detail are developed in the processes of selecting lead agencies, developing the required six-year operating and capital expenditure plan, and ultimately reviewing and approving the 1990 County budget for mental health. Nevertheless, the Council intends to establish the following parameters for the 1989-91 revenues and expenditures and allocation plan.

1989-91 Estimated Revenue and Expenditure Summary (Attachment A) This attachment constitutes King County's proposed budget of \$46.29 million for the 1989-91 biennium, which includes the first one-and-one-half years of operation as a Regional Support Network under the Mental Health Reform Act of 1989.

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Allocation Plan for New State Funds Requested from the Legislature (Attachment B) This attachment shows how the new funding, which was requested from the legislature in the winter of 1989, will be allocated among the components of the new mental health system for the remainder of the 1989-91 biennium, beginning in January, 1990.

3. Community Support System

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- King County recognizes that a disproportionate number of persons with mental illness currently live in the Central/North Region and that this is due primarily to the lack of service and housing options in the outlying areas. At the same time, King County recognizes that services in all regions are not adequate to meet the needs of existing residents with mental illness, particularly for persons who need residential support. King County is, therefore, committed to both improving the adequacy of services where persons currently reside as well as developing services more evenly throughout the county so that residents do not have to leave their natural communities in order to obtain necessary care. The County's mental health funding policies and plans shall address both issues, but shall over time show progress in correcting the current imbalance between services in the Central/North Region and the three other regions. Housing development plans and activities for the county's mentally ill shall also address the imbalance issue.
- b. King County is committed to providing ethnic minorities equal access to services, appropriate levels of service, choice of providers and culturally relevant services. Existing specialized services for ethnic minorities, therefore, shall be maintained and enhanced for the purposes of ensuring equivalency and meeting the new requirements to provide a complete range of community support services.

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Through a request for proposal process used to select lead agencies, the county shall require lead agency proposers to work with specialized minority providers to ensure access for ethnic minorities to the full range of community support services, including specialized, culturally relevant services, and to utilize the expertise of minority specialists in the provision of crisis intervention, resource management and community support services.

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Through a similar kind of process, the county shall require specialized minority service providers to work with lead agencies, take on the full service responsibilities of a primary community support service provider, and work with the county to develop and use assessment and enrollment procedures which allow direct access to specialized minority providers while maintaining primary client enrollment and placement authority with the lead agencies under the direction of the county. The lead agencies shall be responsible for ensuring that eligible persons have access to services regardless of where they live or what ethnic or cultural group they identify with and shall use the expertise of ethnic minority specialists as needed to assist with this responsibility.

4. Crisis Response System

- a. Within the total budget available for crisis intervention services, funding priority shall be given to subregional services which integrate voluntary and involuntary responses.
- b. At a minimum, subregional crisis intervention services shall be provided during all peak hours throughout the week.

 Centralized crisis intervention services may be provided during off hours to assure efficient use of resources. When subregional crisis teams are in operation, all decisions regarding involuntary

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- c. Of the \$46.31 million proposed for expenditure in the plan, a total of \$11,592,548 (\$3,964,835 of which is new state funding) shall be allocated to the crisis response system. In addition, the amount of funds allocated to the subregional teams for contracted crisis intervention services and for Involuntary Treatment Services staff shall not be less than the amounts shown in the budget in Attachment A (\$3,136,562 total). Amounts shall be increased if needed to provide adequate peak hour coverage.
- d. In providing crisis intervention services, every effort shall be made to resolve crises in the least restrictive manner possible and to use involuntary detention only as the last resort.
- e. A specific plan shall be developed for providing crisis telephone access and screening services within the crisis response system prior to allocating funds to a particular agency for those purposes. The plan shall specify the functions and relationships of these services to the other components of the crisis response system.

5. Resource Management Services

a. King County shall delegate line responsibility for Resource Management Services to the selected lead agency in each subregion. Resource Management Services responsibilities shall include: enrollment, placement and discharge for all persons in need of community support and residential services; liaison with inpatient units to assure enrollment of eligible persons and adequate discharge planning prior to their release; the entry of client information into the tracking system; and, the sharing of

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client information with other components of the mental health system for the purposes of assuring coordinated, continuous and effective care.

- b. King County shall exercise its ultimate responsbility and authority for the care of eligible residents by coordinating the work of the lead agencies, resolving countywide or interregional issues not resolvable by the lead agencies alone, regularly reviewing and approving lead agency enrollment, placement and discharge decisions and providing countywide client locator and resource tracking systems.
- B. The King County executive is hereby authorized to transmit the Plan to the State of Washington Department of Social and Health Services as the basis for King County's participation, assuming adequate State resources, as a Regional Support Network as defined in 1989 Mental Health Reform Act.

In order to meet the requirments and timelines of the new Act as outlined in the plan, King County will need an additional \$13.85 million in state funding in the 1989-91 biennium as well as maintenance of the existing funding base of \$26.92 million. Less funding than these totals will not be adequate unless requirements are adjusted correspondingly.

- C. As part of the 1990 Executive Proposed Budget, which will be submitted to the council on or around October 15, the King County executive shall provide two alternative 1990 budgets for mental health -- a status quo budget and an enhanced budget based on the plan. The enhanced budget shall include:
- A plan for reorganizing mental health administration into a division, including involuntary treatment services;
- A work program showing key system implementation and planning projects with milestones and completion dates; and

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- 3. descriptions of the purposes scope and methods of the numerous evaluation and planning projects which are proposed in the plan, including at least:
 - a) the childrens' mental health system plan;
- b) evaluations of the implementation of integrated crisis intervention services and regional community support systems;
 - c) special needs system development studies; and
 - d) the housing development plan.

If agreement has not been reached with the State of Washington Department of Social and Health Services by the time the council must make final decisions on the 1990 budget, the council will adopt the status quo budget and reconsider the enhanced budget at the time when such agreement is reached.

D. The council intends to accelerate the executive's proposed schedule for development of the children's mental health plan in order to prepare a chilren's mental health legislative agenda for the 1990 legislative session. The council hereby directs the executive to submit by August 21, 1989 an ordinance appropriating funds so that the children's coordinator can be hired at the earliest date possible in 1989. The executive is authorized to begin recruiting for this position immediately.

PUBLIC COMMENTS KING COUNTY'S PLAN FOR ADULT MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES: A NEW DIRECTION DRAFT PLAN MAY 26, 1989
