A MOTION directing the Executive and District Court to organize a centralized program for collection of District Court fines, fees and penalties.

WHEREAS, the warrants division, formerly known as the division of bails, fines and penalty collection, has been disbanded by the district court, and

WHEREAS, the former warrants division director has been transferred to the office of finance, and

WHEREAS, the King County council has transferred the functions and responsibilities for collecting fines, fees and monetary penalties resulting from action taken by the district court to the office of finance in Ordinance 9283, and

WHEREAS, approximately 85,000 delinquent cases currently exist for an amount in excess of \$10 million dollars, and

WHEREAS, there is an ongoing caseload of time payment agreements and additional delinquent accounts, and

WHEREAS, the success of the new fines, fees and penalty collection section in the office of finance will require close coordination and cooperation between the office of finance and the district court, and

WHEREAS, collection of district court fines, fees and penalties which have become delinquent is essential to the maintenance of the court's credibility and fairness to the people of King County, and

WHEREAS, fines, fees and penalties include criminal violations, criminal traffic violations, and traffic infractions, and

WHEREAS, a centralized collection of time payment agreements for criminal violations, criminal traffic violations and traffic infractions as well as centralized collection enforcement on Failure to Respond (FTR) notices will promote efficient collection and consistent and timely notification and collection practices, and

WHEREAS, currently the district court is conducting no direct collection effort relating to time payment agreements, and

WHEREAS, currently the district court does not conduct follow-up and collection enforcement action following notification to the state department of licensing of unpaid infractions, and

WHEREAS, access to the DISCIS system which can be utilized in collection efforts is available in the King County courthouse, and

WHEREAS, the office of financial management currently handles district court probation payment notifications and collections, and

WHEREAS, the state department of licensing only influences enforcement of collection in four-year intervals at the date of driver's license renewal and has only limited influence on collection, and

WHEREAS, actual notice and follow-up is needed to effect collection;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

A. The office of financial management (OFM) shall establish a centralized collection program to collect outstanding revenue from criminal violations, criminal traffic violations and traffic violations.
