Bruce Laing SS:pb:bhc Proposed No.: 90-790 1 8056 2 MOTION NO. 3 A MOTION authorizing the Executive to 4 negotiate agreements with cities for the 5 transfer of certain park and recreation 6 facilities. 7 WHEREAS, King County's multi-year financial plan in the 8 1990 adopted budget assumes county-owned neighborhood parks, 9 community parks, athletic fields, activity centers, swimming 10 pools, and recreation programs inside city boundaries will be 11 transferred to the cities, and 12 WHEREAS, recent incorporation and annexations reduced 13 county revenues needed to pay for discretionary services like 14 15 parks and recreation, and WHEREAS, cities have greater taxing authority to raise 16 revenues for discretionary services like parks and recreation, 17 18 and WHEREAS, with the exception of certain regional facilities 19 that serve a county-wide constituency, park and recreation 20 facilities and programs serve local communities, and 21 WHEREAS, King County's obligations for new community park 22 facilities in unincorporated King County have expanded and the 23 county desires to ensure that park and recreation facilities 24 are acquired and improved concurrent with other development, 25 26 and these will require additional resources, and WHEREAS, King County's obligations for regional services, 27 particularly the major criminal justice services of courts, 28 prosecution, public defense and jail, will require additional 29 30 resources; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County: 31 A. The executive is hereby authorized to negotiate 32 agreements with cities in King County to transfer in an orderly 33 manner certain county-owned park and recreation facilities and 34

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programs to the cities in which they are located. The agreements should conform, as closely as possible, to the following policies and priorities:

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1. King County will retain ownership of and operational responsibility for regional parks and recreational facilities it currently owns inside cities except that, under special conditions in which cities guarantee through an executed agreement they will operate them as regional facilities, 8 ownership of such parks or recreation facilities may be transferred to cities. For purposes of this motion, regional 10 means the park or facility's service area is county-wide or 11 greater. A preliminary list of existing and proposed parks, 12 recreation facilities and trails in King County which have been 13 determined to meet the definition of regional is provided in Attachment A. 15

2. King County will transfer to cities ownership of and 16 operating/financial responsibility for all neighborhood parks, 17 community parks and athletic field complexes, community 18 swimming pools, and community centers. Alternatively, on an 19 interim basis, cities may pay King County the net cost of 20 operations and maintenance for the county to continue operating 21 and maintaining the park or facility on behalf of the city. 22

3. Transfer of ownership will be without financial 23 compensation but instead for mutual public benefit in the form 24 25 of the following conditions to transfer as covenants to title: the property must be developed, maintained, and operated in 26 27 perpetuity for park and recreation purposes; the city, its successors and assigns, may not limit access to the park so as 28 29 to restrict usage by non-city residents and may never impose any fees or charges that are different for non-city residents 30 than for city residents; and for athletic fields and activity 31 centers, the city must provide for county organized activities, 32 time and space as mutually agreed by the county and city. The 33 transfer covenants for particular parks and recreation 34 facilities shall reflect applicable policies of any adopted 35

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county parks and open space plan. In the event the city violates any one of these conditions, the title shall, with the county's consent, revert to the county.

4. First priority should be negotiation of agreements with the new cities of Federal Way and SeaTac, which together 5 have the greater number of county-owned parks and activity 6 centers inside city boundaries. The agreement should result in 7 transfer of financial responsibility for operations and 8 maintenance by January 1, 1993 and full transfer of title no 9 later than January 1, 1994. 10

5. Second priority should be initiation of negotiations 11 with the twelve cities containing county-owned and operated 12 swimming pools with the objective of transferring full 13 financial responsibility for the pools to the cities by January 14 1, 1994 and gradually reducing the county's financial 15 obligations each year until that date. 16

6. Third priority should be completion of negotiations 17 of an agreement with the City of Tukwila to transfer Fort Dent 18 Park as authorized by King County Ordinance Number 8861 but 19 only if the terms of the agreement ensure the city will 20 continue to operate the park as a regional facility serving 21 regional users. 22

7. Fourth priority should be negotiation of agreements 23 with the cities of Kirkland, Des Moines, and North Bend for the 24 transfer of the community parks and activity centers inside the 25 cities boundaries. 26

8. Fifth priority should be the few remaining countyowned small parks in Bellevue, Redmond, and Kent.

B. In the event and to the extent cities are unwilling to 29 assume responsibility for the county-owned community park and 30 recreation facilities within their boundaries, the King County 31 32 council requests the executive to prepare and present a contingency plan to reduce the costs of operating and 33 34 maintaining those facilities or to close some facilities, if

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1	necessary, to help cover the increasing costs of the county's
2	regional responsibilities.
