A MOTION adopting the 1993 Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy and authorizing the King County Executive to submit the Plan to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development and to submit an application for 1993 Community Development Block Grant entitlement funds.

WHEREAS, the 1990 National Affordable Housing Act as amended, establishes a program of financial assistance to local governments for the development of viable urban communities through the provision of decent housing and a suitable living environment and expanded economic opportunities, primarily for persons of low and moderate income, and

WHEREAS, the Act provides that the Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy (CHAS) is the focus for mutual cooperation between local jurisdictions and United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) housing programs for carrying out locally determined housing strategies, and

WHEREAS, the Community Development Block Grant Consortium Joint Policy Committee has reviewed and approved the Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy, required by federal law to be submitted as part of the community development block grant program, and

WHEREAS, King County has held public hearings to hear the views of citizens on housing and community development needs, and

WHEREAS, the federal government through adoption and administration of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, will make \$4.0 billion of 1993 Community Development Block Grant funds available nationwide, and

WHEREAS, King County as the lead agency in a consortium with twenty-six cities and towns is entitled to approximately \$5,587,850, and

WHEREAS, the federal government through the regulations for the Community Development Block Grant Program requires King County to submit an

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application for the funds to HUD, and these federal funds will be appropriated by the King County council in the 1993 budget ordinance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

- A. The Council of King County finds and determines that the Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy, Attachment A, reflects current conditions for housing assistance in King County, reflects the needs and priorities for housing assistance in King County and supersedes the 1992 Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy after adoption by the council and approval by HUD.
- B. The 1993 Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy (October 1992) is adopted as part of the overall community development program.
- C. The King County executive is hereby authorized to submit the 1993

 Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy and the application for 1993 Community Development Block Grant entitlement funds to HUD.
- D. The King County executive is authorized to use this Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy in reviewing and ranking projects proposed for federal housing assistance under Section 213 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended.
- E. It is the county's intention that federal housing agencies comply with both the spirit and the letter of the goals and priorities stated in this Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy when making program allocations and conducting other activities in the county.

Community Relations

Community relations refer to the activities undertaken by the project sponsor to establish and maintain positive relationships with neighbors of the assisted housing units.

Policy: Project sponsors are encouraged to undertake activities to establish and maintain positive relationships with neighbors of assisted housing units.

Many experienced nonprofit housing developers have found that the long-term success of assisted housing projects is enhanced by establishing positive community relationships. This process typically includes: introducing the agency; describing the proposed project; providing information about the client population; inviting input from neighbors; and facilitating community meetings as needed.

Each Request For Proposal for funds governed by the CHAS will include a list of activities that may be undertaken to enhance community relations. Consortium member staff will offer guidance in designing a step-by-step community relations process. If requested, staff may also provide names of other agencies who have developed successful community relationships. Staff may attend community meetings at the request of the project sponsor.

Funding and siting decisions made by the fund source cannot be conditioned upon community response to a project. Confidential shelters for victims of domestic violence are exempt from this policy for the protection of the clients.
