MOTION NO.

A MOTION establishing the 1993 State Legislation Program for King County.

WHEREAS, the King County council and the King County executive want to bring their positions on issues facing the 1993 Washington State Legislature to the attention of Washington State Legislators, and

WHEREAS, King County wants to work cooperatively with other local governments and other organizations such as the Washington State Association of Counties, the Washington Association of County Officials, the Suburban Cities Association, and the Association of Washington Cities, and

WHEREAS, counties have been recognized by the legislature as partners with the state in the delivery of such critical services as criminal justice, health and human services, and

WHEREAS, in November, 1992 the voters of King County approved a substantial reorganization of King County government involving the assimilation of Metro and other measures intended to strengthen King County's role as a regional government, all to be effective January, 1994, and

WHEREAS, the King County council and the King County executive will continue to review legislative developments for possible revisions of King County's 1993 State Legislation Program;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

The specific objectives set forth in this motion are King
County's highest priorities for passage during the 1993 session
of the Washington State Legislature.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE FUNDING

The Criminal Justice funding package which was authorized in 1990 expires on December 31, 1993. King County will seek to make permanent both the allocation of state MVET revenues to

counties and the local sales tax component of the criminal justice funding package.

REGIONAL SERVICES FUNDING

Seek legislation which authorizes counties, at their option, to impose taxes county-wide in order to help fund services which are provided to all county residents such as health, human services and criminal justice services.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES - CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

PROVIDE A HEALTHY START FOR ALL CHILDREN. Seek a state budget that maintains and enhances proven preventive programs including WIC, public health outreach to families with newborns, pre- and post-natal care for low income mothers and infants and early childhood immunization.

EXPAND MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES FOR SERIOUSLY EMOTIONALLY DISTURBED CHILDREN. Seek a state budget that provides the additional funding necessary to meet state and federal requirements under the Early Periodic Screening Diagnosis and Treatment Program for mental health assessment and treatment for medicaid eligible children. King County is committed to fulfilling its role in managing care for both children and adults under mental health reform and is particularly concerned about the need for more treatment for children, but cannot jeopardize the ability to meet its responsibilities for adults by having these new requirements applied without necessary funding increases.

REAUTHORIZE CRIMINAL JUSTICE FUNDING FOR COORDINATED DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SERVICES. King County in partnership with its cities has developed a comprehensive program of coordinated legal and social services designed to effectively stop the recurring cycle of abuse and its negative impact on the health and welfare of children and families. King County and its partners seek the authority to continue this program through reauthorization of the criminal justice funding package.

SUPPORT EFFORTS TO INCREASE COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN CHILDREN'S PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT. King County encourages the

legislature to consider funding some of the Family Policy Initiative proposals on a demonstration basis.

Seek state funding for public counsel costs now incurred by the county in the course of child dependency cases brought in court by DSHS.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES - LONG TERM AND REHABILITATIVE CARE

Build upon the progress of system reforms which stress community-based, managed care for persons most in need, reduce and stabilize the use of institutional care, increase the use of generic community resources and improve overall results.

MAINTAIN THE MOMENTUM OF MENTAL HEALTH REFORM. In order to meet the 1993 - 1995 biennium requirements for managing use of state hospital as well as local care, King County seeks a budget that at least maintains current level support for the adult mental health system including the community and institutions, authorization to include Medicaid funding in the Regional Support Network system, requirements that the Developmental Disabilities and Alcohol/Substance Abuse systems share responsibility with Mental Health for services to handle the acute problems of persons with other types of disabling conditions in both community and institutional settings and increased funding to meet the new Children's EPSDT requirements. King County opposes any reductions to the state hospital and local inpatient budgets which are not offset by related increases to the RSN's necessary to sustain lower hospital use.

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES. King County supports proposed reforms which would transfer operational management of all community services to counties or groups of counties and remove most categorical restrictions in return for improvements in service access and outcomes and increased use of generic community resources. King County will not, however, take on this increased responsibility unless state funding is sufficient to enable King county to effectively manage these programs.

ALCOHOL/SUBSTANCE ABUSE. King County proposes a reform of the alcohol/substance abuse system to provide a more appropriate set of services than "revolving door" detoxification for persons with chronic inebriation problems. New services would be supported by a dedicated, local option addition to the alcohol tax. Counties imposing the tax would also be given greater flexibility in the use of existing categorical state and federal funds to better meet the community's most urgent treatment and prevention needs.

MAINTAIN AIDS OMNIBUS FUNDING. King County seeks a budget that increases funding for the Regional AIDS Service Networks in line with demand and that helps to fill the gap in prevention/education created by federal reductions.

HEALTH CARE REFORM

King County supports reforms to achieve the goals of universal access, cost containment and health promotion/disease prevention. King County seeks coordinated development of health care reform and related public health and long term care reforms necessary to assure the benefits of prevention on the one hand and adequate care for those persons most in need on the other. King County supports reform of the governance of the public health system with adequate funding.

HOUSING

CONTINUE STATE AND LOCAL FUNDING FOR SPECIAL NEEDS AND LOW INCOME FAMILY HOUSING. King County seeks continued and expanded support for the state Housing Trust Fund and a dedicated local tax source for matching state and federal funds for low income housing development. Continued housing development is critical to the success of all of the efforts to reform and strengthen health and human services programs.

Support legislation which brings Washington Fair Housing
Law into conformance with the Federal Fair Housing Act
Amendments of 1988.

JUVENILE JUSTICE

Monitor amendments to the juvenile justice act to insure that any such amendments are accompanied by funds necessary for implementation.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

Seek authority for uniformed police officers to use audio recording in conjunction with authorized video recordings during the course of police patrol activities.

GROWTH MANAGEMENT

Seek an extension to the current July 1, 1993 deadline for adoption of comprehensive plans under the growth management act, provided that the authority to continue the use of impact fees under local authority is also continued to coincide with new deadlines.

Oppose substantive amendments to the growth management act which are intended to weaken the act such as curbs on environmental protection and proposals to require compensation for property owners as a result of regulatory actions required by the act.

Seek to insure that growth management funds budgeted for grants to local governments remain at least at current levels.

SOLID WASTE

Seek authority for counties to establish minimum service levels for recycling at commercial establishments. Currently, counties may set service levels for residential recycling programs but not for recycling by commercial and business establishments in the unincorporated area.

Oppose legislation which repeals the 1993 sunset on 1989 legislation which precluded local government authority to ban any form of product packaging.

Seek legislation which authorizes an administrative and quasi judicial appeal process for counties whose landfills have been named as superfund sites by the Department of Ecology.

ADULT CORRECTIONS

Monitor legislation proposed by the state to expand alternatives to incarceration for certain first time offenders

to insure that mandates are not imposed on counties which 2 result in increased jail population or treatment programs 3 managed and funded by counties. TRANSPORTATION

Defend existing elements of the Rapid Transit Authority (RTA) legislation and support efforts to seek supplemental funding sources for the RTA.

Support efforts to enhance funding for multi-modal transportation needs.

Seek legislation which authorizes exemptions to the \$15 vehicle registration fee for senior citizens and low-income persons.

UNINCORPORATED AREA GOVERNANCE

Monitor and support, as determined by this council, legislation which provides formal mechanisms for unincorporated areas to communicate with and advise the county legislative authority.

METRO GOVERNANCE

Seek amendments to Metro Governance legislation as determined necessary by the Metro merger transition process.

GENERAL GOVERNMENT

Seek legislation authorizing counties to recover the costs of collection incurred by collection agencies or attorneys from Currently, only the courts are so authorized.

Seek legislation which authorizes libraries as a permitted activity on county-owned park land.

Seek legislation which authorizes counties to negotiate with adjacent property owners for the sale of tax title surplus land parcels.

Seek legislation which authorizes surplus Road Improvement District funds to accrue to the county road fund at the discretion of the County Council. Currently, such funds must accrue to the county current expense fund.

Support legislation which transfers the collection of the 1 2 local option boat tax to the Washington State Department of 3 Licensing. Seek legislation which authorizes county legislative 4 authorities to delegate responsibility for holding hearings on 5 assessment rolls for road improvement districts to the hearing 6 examiner. 7 Seek legislation which authorizes counties to continue to 8 impose that portion of surface water management fees within 9 newly annexed or incorporated areas, necessary to pay for 10 capital improvements in place at the time of annexation or 11 incorporation. 12 Monitor legislation concerning geographic information 13 systems and other information systems to assure that local 14 governments are able to recover costs and are not precluded 15 from offering specialized services to the public. 16 PASSED this day of 17 KING COUNTY COUNCIL 18 KING COUNTY, WASHINGTON 19 20 21 ATTEST: 22 23 24 25 Attachments: 26
