MOTION NO.

A MOTION supporting new federal budget priorities for the United States of America.

WHEREAS, King County, which ranks 13th among 3,000 U.S. counties in total population (1,564,500 estimated in 1992), considers the welfare of its youth to be a high priority, and

WHEREAS, King County recognizes the importance of providing every child in our community a quality education and encouraging children to succeed in school at least through graduation from high school, and

WHEREAS, there is a well-established relationship between lack of success in school and later use of expensive county criminal justice services and facilities, and

WHEREAS, the success of children in school depends in part on successfully addressing risk factors, such as health and self-esteem, long before they enter school, and

WHEREAS, the county council has provided leadership in adopting policies and funding early intervention and prevention programs which serve at-risk pre-school and school-age youth, and

WHEREAS, King County provides directly or through contract a variety of recreational, cultural, health and human service programs to youth in partnership with its 19 local public school districts and other agencies serving youth, and

WHEREAS, specific programs serving pre-school and schoolage children provided or supported by the county include youth
and family networks, alcohol and substance abuse prevention and
treatment, summer reading camp, young family independence
program, vocational education, cooperative extension, child
health and nutritional education, drug abuse resistance

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education (DARE), pre- and post-natal health care, immunizations, child care, tutoring for detained youth, latenight teen recreation, and

WHEREAS, our nation's success in the post-Cold War world will depend on the ability of our community's public schools to educate each and every child, and

WHEREAS, no single community school district has the financial capacity to both build a quality education program for the 21st Century and overcome the social and economic problems that prevent students from coming to school ready to learn, and

WHEREAS, the federal government often mandates programs to address social and economic issues at the local school district level but does not adequately fund them, thus limiting the local capacity to adequately educate children,

WHEREAS, the end of the Cold War and the collapse of the Soviet Union offer a once-in-a-generation opportunity to make education one of our most important national priorities, and

WHEREAS, the United States ranks fourteenth among industrial nations in spending tax dollars on children and elementary and secondary education, and

WHEREAS, the national organizations that represent people at the local level who care deeply about education -- the National School Boards Association, the National Parent Teacher Association, the National Association of Elementary School Principals, the National Association of Secondary School Principals, the American Association of School Administrators, the Council of Great City Schools, the National Education Association, and the American Federation of Teachers--have jointly called for new federal budget priorities that reflect post-cold War realities;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the King County Council:

A. The King County Council joins school districts and local governments across the United States in urging Congress and the President to reorder federal spending priorities with

the goals of ensuring that every child comes to school healthy 1 and ready to learn and that every child is provided a high 2 quality education. 3 B.
