MOTION NO. 8991

A MOTION adopting phase one of a comprehensive plan for persons affected with substance abuse.

WHEREAS, the work of Troyer-Merkel (1986) and others indicates that significant amounts of public funds are used to deliver inappropriate services to an estimated 1,000 chronic public inebriates in Seattle, and

WHEREAS, high demand for county detoxification services by the chronic public inebriate population led to a conversion which provided more beds within existing resources by reducing service intensity, and

WHEREAS, the conversion of the detoxification program to less intensive beds resulted in a finding by the state that the program did not meet minimum standards and a finding by the county auditor that conditions were unsanitary and unsafe, and

WHEREAS, to correct the deficiencies at the detoxification program the county has had to budget significant additional current expense funds while at the same time reducing service levels and increasing the overflow of chronic public inebriates to the Harborview emergency room, and

WHEREAS, in the fall of 1992, the King County Division of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services began a comprehensive planning process including assessment and overall improvement of services for county residents, and

WHEREAS, the first phase of the planning process resulted in a comprehensive plan for chronic public inebriates--those residents who have a longstanding, serious, and public problem with alcohol, and

WHEREAS, the initial phase focused on the design based on a combination of the latest knowledge of the field as well as the expertise of our local community--of a continuum or array

1 of services that would assist the chronic public inebriate  
2 population in ways that are more appropriate;

3 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:

4 A. The recommended array of services for chronic public  
5 inebriates (Attachment A) in phase one of the comprehensive  
6 plan for persons affected by substance abuse in King County is  
7 hereby adopted with an amendment adding a new subsection at the  
8 end of the Housing Section on page 90 to read as follows:

9 Location and Siting

10 Transitional and permanent housing developed as part of  
11 this program shall be located and sited in accord with the  
12 Policies Governing the Location and Siting of Assisted  
13 Housing Projects specified on pages 127 through 130 of the  
14 adopted 1993 King County Consortium Comprehensive Housing  
15 Affordability Strategy.

16 B. The implementation plan dated May 5, 1993 (Attachment  
17 B) is hereby adopted provided that the responsibility to  
18 develop a public education component of the program is added to  
19 the responsibilities of the system coordinator position.

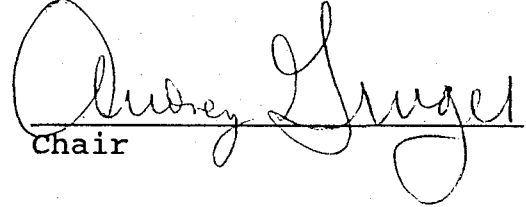
20 Provided further that:

21 Implementation is predicated on the understanding that  
22 funding for services for the chronic public inebriate  
23 population is not a primary county responsibility. The county  
24 will seek grants to demonstrate the effectiveness of new  
25 service approaches and will continue to seek resolution with  
26 the cities and state of the issue of how to more adequately and  
27 appropriately support chemical dependency services.


1 C. The executive is requested to designate staff resources  
2 to organize and lead program design efforts, including system  
3 coordination.
