MOTION NO. 9718

A MOTION requesting the King County executive, in cooperation with the mayor of the city of Seattle, to convene an advisory panel to study health status and the changing state of health care in King County and recommend actions to the King County council by which King County and the Seattle-King County health department can most appropriately carry out their roles to protect and promote the health of the residents of King County.

WHEREAS, King County has a major role in responding to the health needs of its residents through the Metropolitan King County council's authority and responsibility as the King County board of health, the operation of the Seattle-King County department of public health in partnership with the city of Seattle, as contractor, through the Board of Trustees for medical services at Harborview Medical Center, and as provider of health benefits for county employees, and

unprecedented and controversial changes primarily as a result of private sector and federal and state government efforts to contain costs while also working to maintain effectiveness and improve access, and

WHEREAS, the health care system is undergoing

WHEREAS, the emphasis on restructuring health service finance and delivery to contain costs is raising concerns regarding effects on choice and quality of care among

Whereas, the Metropolitan King County council at its January 20, 1995 Committee-of-the-Whole meeting heard reports from nurses, who serve at local hospitals, on their deep concerns regarding changes in hospital policies and operations related to cost containment and managed care and how they impact patient health, and

WHEREAS, changes in the health care system as well as increased concerns about threats to public health from new strains of infectious diseases and increasing health risks for children and youth are also bringing about a need to reexamine the functions and directions of public health programming, and

WHEREAS, the Washington Health Services Act of 1993 recognizes the need to focus on improvement of the health of the state's population as a necessary companion to, and integral part of, improving the overall health care system and, therefore, required submission of the Public Health Improvement Plan to the 1995 session of the legislature for its review and approval, and

WHEREAS, the Public Health Improvement Plan was adopted by the legislature in the 1995 session, and

WHEREAS, the Public Health Improvement Plan provides a framework that emphasizes a preventive role for public health in partnership with the health care system and other services and systems; defines core public health functions including assessment, policy development and assurance; sets capacity standards for carrying out these functions; and identifies a set of health problem areas and health outcome standards to provide a structure for identifying needs and resources and

WHEREAS, adoption of the Public Health Improvement Plan requires a review of current public health roles, functions, programs and financing needs in light of changing health needs and health care system changes, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 11578 adopting the 1995 budget for King County included a proviso requiring the health department by April 15, 1995 to develop and submit for council review and approval a proposed work program and schedule for developing a plan to implement the stateapproved Public Health Implementation Plan, and

WHEREAS, there is a need to assess health status trends and changes in health systems and their impacts on, and implications for, public health programming, the continued operations of Harborview Medical Center, and King County as a major employer and local purchaser of health care services, and

WHEREAS, such an assessment would constitute the first step in implementing the Public Health Improvement Plan in King County and would satisfy the budget proviso contained in Ordinance Number 11578;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT MOVED by the Council of KingCounty:

A. The King County executive, in cooperation with the mayor of the city of Seattle, is requested to convene an advisory panel to study health status and the state of the health care system in King County and recommend actions by which King County and the Seattle-King County department of public health can most appropriately carry out their roles and responsibilities to protect and promote the health of the

residents of King County. The director of public health shall chair the panel.

B. The advisory panel shall assess health status and the state of the health care system in King County, identify key, emerging public health and health care system issues and recommend actions to the Regional Policy Committee and the county council by which King County and the Seattle-King County department of public health can most appropriately help to maintain and enhance the health status of King County residents, the effective functioning of the health care system and the role of Harborview Medical Center as a model public and teaching hospital. Recommendations may also be made to other health related bodies where appropriate.

14 C. The advisory panel shall be broadly representative of all sectors interested in public health and health care issues including but not limited to representatives of health 17 and public health professional associations, labor, hospital and health service organizations, hospital districts, 18 19 consumer groups, broad-based community boards and 20 commissions, local governments (Seattle and Suburban Cities Association), community health clinics, academia and the 22 board of trustees of Harborview Medical Center Hospital. In the interest of balance, no one sector or type of group shall 24 have more than two representatives. The advisory panel may 25 be supported by an additional technical advisory group.

26 D. The executive shall convene the advisory panel and 27 submit a work program and staffing plan to the Regional 28 Policy Committee and the council no later than February 1, 29 1996. The work program and staffing plan shall be 30 accompanied by a background report describing the current

legislative and planning framework regarding health care reform and public health and the movement towards managed care and other major trends in the health care marketplace.

E. The work program shall:

1. identify and coordinate with other community health assessment and policy development efforts in which the health department is participating with other departments, jurisdictions and community groups such as the Human Development Strategic Planning Initiative of the city of Seattle, the Envisioning a Healthy Community Benchmark Project of the King County children and family commission and the assessment and planning work of the new state-initiated Community Health and Safety Networks, and

2. include opportunities for public participation and input.

F. The advisory panel shall provide a progress report to the Regional Policy Committee and the council regarding the panel's assessment process and the identification of key health and health system issues by July 15, 1996 and shall submit a final report to the Regional Policy Committee and the council by December 1, 1996.
