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

## Executive Summary

#### ■ BACKGROUND

In 1973, King County became one of the first county governments to institute a percent for art program, designating one percent of eligible construction project budgets for the creation and purchase of public artworks. The program was reorganized in 1996 when the King County 1% for Art Program and the Metro Arts Program for Transit and Water Pollution Control were consolidated to form a new and expanded public art program. The resulting program is one of the largest and most innovative programs of its type in the country.

Ordinance 12089 established the consolidated public art program and created the King County Public Art Commission, a nine member citizen advisory body appointed by the Executive and confirmed by the County Council. The duties of the Commission include establishing policies to guide the Public Art Program, advising the Executive and County Council on matters related to public art and developing the Public Art Program Annual Plan in cooperation with County Client Departments.

The purpose of the Public Art Program established by Ordinance 12089 is to:

- Integrate the work and thinking of artists into the planning, design and construction of county facilities, buildings and public spaces;
- Enhance and enrich the county's physical environment and public spaces;
- Celebrate the multi-cultural and diverse character of its communities;
- Contribute a sense of ownership and pride in public facilities and spaces to county citizens;
- Mitigate potential adverse impacts of construction;
- Engage the citizens and communities of the county in creative partnerships with artists; and
- Support, educate and assist citizens with their community activities in which public art plays a part.

#### ■ DEVELOPMENT OF THE ANNUAL PLAN

The annual appropriation to the Public Art Fund is used to support the Public Art Program, ensuring that the works and thinking of visual artists are included in the planning, design and construction of county facilities and public spaces. All capital improvement projects that are visible, publicly accessible or for which there is a need for mitigation, contribute to the fund; the appropriation is calculated on 1% of the eligible construction costs.

Ordinance 12089 states: "Following approval of the County's annual budget and Public Art Fund appropriation, the Public Art Commission, in cooperation with the Client Departments, shall submit a Public Art Program plan that describes the art projects to be initiated from the fund, the budget recommended for each art project, and any special project categories to allow for program flexibility and responsiveness. The annual program plan shall be transmitted by the Executive to the Council in sufficient time to be reviewed by the Council and for spending authority to be approved by the first month of the fiscal year. Approval of the annual program plan by the Council will constitute approval for the Executive to enter into contracts for services or purchases necessary to carry out the stated policies and implement the Public Art Program."

As part of the 1997 public art planning process, Directors of the four departments that generate public art funding through capital programs met with the Public Art Commission to discuss priorities and allocation of funds. Each Director then appointed staff to work with the Public Art Program to identify projects appropriate for a public art component. This close working relationship resulted in a Public Art Program Annual Plan supported by the County Client Departments as well as the Public Art Commission.

The King County 1997 Annual Budget identifies \$403,485 in new revenue for the Public Art Program. The 1997 Public Art Program Annual Plan proposes new project appropriations totaling \$533,700. Revenue to cover these proposed expenditures will come from new revenue plus \$130,215 from the unexpended fund balance in Fund 3201.

As mandated by ordinance, a portion of all revenue generated for public art by various County CIP projects is used to support administration of the Public Art Program, maintenance for the County's art collection and other programmatic commitments such as outreach and education.

#### ■ CRITERIA FOR PROJECT PRIORITIZATION

Although the primary purpose of the annual plan is to describe the projects that will be produced by the Public Art Program for County Council review and approval, the development of the plan presents an opportunity for the Commission to solicit ideas and direction from County citizens and Client Departments, assess project status, develop management and programming priorities and establish long range policies and goals.

The Public Art Commission has adopted the following priorities, which are reflected in the Public Art Program Annual Plan: ensure that the program is properly managed and staffed; continue an outstanding program of maintenance and stewardship of the County's existing public art collection; develop new projects that illustrate strong partnerships with communities and County Client Departments; ensure that the artwork reflects the diverse population of King County; and develop educational and outreach components to ensure that projects are understood and accessible to citizens.

Not every CIP project that contributes to the annual appropriation for public art is appropriate for an art project. The Public Art Program staff and County Client Departments used the following criteria to recommend the projects proposed for development in 1997:

- The project presents a good, or perhaps unique, opportunity to include the work and/or thinking of visual artists in the design and construction.
- The community has expressed an interest in or support for public art. This is often done through citizen advisory committees, local arts agencies or citizen input like the public art idea bank.
- The artwork is viewed by local residents as a way to mitigate construction impacts or the function of the facility (for example, placing a detention facility, transfer station or sewage treatment plant in a community).
- The geographic location has been identified as a focus community; the area is not served by other arts agencies; there is a dearth of public art in a particular area.
- There is strong support for including an artist in the project design from the project manager and/or project consultants.
- There is a legal mandate (usually due to fund restrictions or bond issues) to include the artwork within the project that generates the art money.
- The timing is right; the project is still in the early stages, the optimum time to bring an artist on board.
- There is an opportunity to form a strong partnership with another agency or jurisdiction that can result in an expanded art project, "in-kind" services or project management.

There are many forms of "public art" from Poetry & Art on Buses, residency programs, large-scale infrastructure projects involving bridges and storm water management, portable works collections, mural projects, bus shelter designs, to integrated site designs and design teams. It is important to select the right scope to meet the needs of the community, Client Department and facility staff.

King County has been acquiring artworks for nearly 30 years. The collection is extremely diverse, consisting of nearly 1,000 objects spread over 2,200 square miles. The entire art collection is surveyed on an annual basis. Necessary repairs will be completed on damaged artworks and works will be resited as required. The public art collection includes permanently sited works located in King County parks and facilities and portable artworks that are rotated on a limited basis to public spaces and county facilities. The Public Art Program has developed an outstanding program of maintenance and conservation which has served as a model for other arts agencies. The proposed maintenance appropriation for 1997 includes the annual maintenance requirements for the Robert Morris earthwork, estimated at \$10,000.

Currently, the public art program is staffed by 2 FTE's. The public art coordinators' duties include: serving as staff to the King County Public Art Commission; developing and monitoring all project budgets and expenditures; supervising contract project managers and extra help personnel; establishing outreach and educational components for projects; and serving in the direct capacity of project manager for projects in progress. The annual appropriation for Project Management is used to pay for the salaries of the Public Art Coordinators and extra-help personnel as well as general office supplies and expenses incurred by the program such as telephone, xerox and postage.

In 1992, the Arts Commission created the Artist-Made Building Parts Project in order to revive and promote the integration of art and architecture and to expand creative employment opportunities for regional artists. The AMBP Project resource materials feature the work of Northwest artists who create functional and decorative building components. The resource is used by the County for direct purchase and also by private sector architects, designers and other artists to purchase artist-made products or services. The AMBP artists are reevaluated every two years; the registry is updated through an open call-to-artists.

The 1997 appropriation will be used in part to pay for the expenses of updating the registry, including issuing a call-for-artists, appointing a selection panel and reprinting the AMBP catalogue. The catalogue is distributed to architectural firms, CIP departments in suburban cities and arts organizations throughout King County.

The commission also proposes initiating a second registry service featuring the work of experienced design team artists. The design team registry will be used by the County as a pre-qualified consultant pool for direct selection. The registry materials will be available for use by private sector developers, designers and government agencies who are looking for artists to include on a design team.

Since 1990, the citizens of King County have had a vehicle for submitting their ideas and suggestions for public art in the form of the Public Art Idea Bank. In 1995 and 1996, the Arts Commission, working collaboratively with the Metro Arts Committee, received several hundred suggestions for public art projects. The following community generated ideas are currently being developed as a result of the 95 & 96 calls-for-ideas:

- Outdoor artwork to commemorate the history of the Snoqualmie Valley. Submitted by Greg Watson, Snoqualmie Valley Historical Museum
- Integrated artwork designed by artist Charles Bigger for a new playground/park which is being constructed next to the Nordic Heritage Museum in Ballard. Submitted by Lillian Riley, Groundswell NW
- Providing funds to hire Norie Sato to develop an arts plan for several Central area development projects including the Central Park Trail. Submitted by Matthew Metz, Central Area Arts Council.
- Providing funding for seniors to create eight specially painted bus shelter murals. Submitted by Seniors Making Art, a non-profit organization that employs artists to work with seniors to create artwork.
- A community initiated project to produce 3-4 murals for walls that have been badly vandalized behind bus zones. Submitted by Street Smart Art, a non-profit organization that works to channel the talents of graffiti artists to productive projects.

The call-for-ideas for possible implementation in 1997 was organized differently than previous solicitations. The King County Public Art Program, working collaboratively with the Seattle Arts Commission, produced a call for public art ideas organized by curator Don Fels. Any King County resident could submit a proposal for a public art project. The proposals were reviewed by a panel of professional artists who selected approximately sixty projects for an exhibit presented during the Bumbershoot Festival. The King County Public Art Commission will appoint another panel to review all the proposals submitted, looking for projects which might be realized within King County. The 1997 appropriation will be used to possibly implement one or more of the projects identified by the panel.

Proposal: As part of the construction of the new Symphony Hall, a new entrance to the bus tunnel from Second Avenue will be built. This entrance is being designed by the Symphony Hall architect LMN and built by the Symphony's contractor Baugh. No County funds were allocated to the construction of this entrance. Therefore, the project did not generate 1% for art dollars. However, because of the significance of this entrance and its anticipated use, pooled Transit art dollars were approved for use in 1996 to hire an artist to develop a proposal for incorporating art into the tunnel entrance.

The artist was instructed to work with a budget of \$35,000, to be allocated from 1997 pooled public art funds. In the meantime, additional money became available for art in the tunnel entrance from the City of Seattle, owner of the property on which the Symphony Hall will be located. The City was obligated to pay King County for one-half the cost of relocating utilities and other site improvements that took place during construction of the bus tunnel. This amounted to \$549,044. Of this amount, the County allowed the City to apply \$65,000 of their 1% for Art Funds to art in the bus tunnel entrance, for a total proposed art budget of \$100,000. Artist Erin Palmer has designed the tunnel entrance finishes, including ceiling, lighting, walls and railing.

Proposal: It is proposed that an artist be hired to work on the design team for a new Novelty Bridge to replace the existing 20' wide substandard bridge. The Novelty Bridge, built in 1920, is the highest ranked bridge in the King County Bridge Needs Report. It is a major thoroughfare in and out of the Snoqualmie Valley, including Duvall and Carnation communities. The plan is to replace the bridge with a tied arch bridge. Conceptually, the tied arch has been endorsed by the local community at public meetings. The silhouette of the proposed tied arch is somewhat reflective of the existing truss bridge. The artist will work with the surrounding communities and the project team to determine how art might be integrated into the design of the new bridge or incorporated in some other way appropriate for the bridge replacement program in the Snoqualmie Valley.
