2	Proposed Master Plan.
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6	WHEREAS, King County has acquired four hundred eighteen acres of
7	undeveloped and developed land along the county's largest river system, and
8	WHEREAS, the land surrounding the confluence of the three branches of the
9	Snoqualmie river outside North Bend and Snoqualmie is a fragile riparian area deserving
10	preservation for the benefit of current and future citizens of King County, and
11	WHEREAS, the Three Forks Natural Area is a strategically located wildlife
12	corridor connecting the Cedar River Watershed, Rattlesnake Mountain Scenic Area and
13	the Mt. Si Natural Resource Conservation Area, and
14	WHEREAS, three of King County's park and recreation's trails, the Snoqualmie
15	Valley, Preston-Snoqualmie and Snoqualmie Valley Trail Extension, converge at Three
16	Forks Natural Area, and
17	WHEREAS, King County has appropriated funds to prepare a master plan for thi
18	natural area, and

19	WHEREAS, King County parks and recreation prepared, and the council has
20	adopted Motion 9925, the park program plan for Three Forks Natural Area, and
21	WHEREAS, the department of construction and facilities management has
22	prepared a master plan for the natural area based upon the adopted park program plan,
23	and
24	WHEREAS, King County has held over seven public meetings and solicited
25	public comments, during the formulation of the master plan, and
26	WHEREAS, the master plan interweaves the conscious stewardship of the scenic
27	and natural resources of the site with the needs and desires of the community and King
28	County, and
29	WHEREAS, the master plan divides the site into land classification units
30	established in the King County park comprehensive plan, including: A. natural areas; B.
31	passive recreation areas; C. special management habitat preservation areas; and D.
32	staging areas (parking), and
33	WHEREAS, some limited portions of Three Forks Natural Area has been in
34	greenchop production in support of King County and Snoqualmie valley agriculture, and
35	WHEREAS, the master plan has been reviewed for potential adverse
36	environmental impacts under the state Environmental Policy Act, and a determination of
37	nonsignificance has been issued on this master plan;
38	NOW THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:
39	The attached Three Forks Natural Area Executive Proposed Master Plan is hereby

Following page II-2 and Figure 2-1, amend Figure 2-2 by deleting "Water Access, small non-5. motorized boat put-in below and between bridges. Foot trail to access point.". 6 7 On Page II-7, under the heading "Water Access", delete "Norman Bridge Put-in (between Norman 8 Bridge and the vehicular bridge along 428th Avenue SE) - formalize foot access trail down to the 9 water, provide information signage and shoreline improvements for small non-motorized boats and 10: 11 fishing access". 12 13 Page II-25, under the heading "Highest Priority", delete "boat launch". AMENDMENT TO THE ATTACHMENT TO PROPOSED MOTION 1999-0462, dated May, 1998.

On Page II-25, delete the entire page titled "Phasing and Priorities" and insert the following:

Capital Projects

Highest priority capital improvement projects are recommended as follows (Note: Dollar amount includes estimates for taxes, design, contingencies and administration).

Project List:

Potential Future Projects:

Funding for development of other capital projects referenced throughout the Three Forks Natural Area master plan may be considered once a biological assessment for ESA compliance and the recommended studies identified on page II-24 of the master plan regarding wildlife and flooding have been completed. In future years, these projects may be considered if it can be demonstrated that they will not have a significant adverse environmental impact on the wildlife and natural areas being preserved.

Effect: This amendment replaces the \$5.2 million capital project list that was included in the executive proposed master plan with a shorter list of capital projects that total \$978,684 (saving approximately \$4,282,141). The capital projects that are listed as priority projects allow limited development to occur on the north side of the Snoqualmie River (where the site has already been disturbed) for public access to the site, while preserving other portions of the site through revegetation projects.

Other capital projects identified throughout the master plan may be considered in the future, but only after the highest priority projects are completed, and only after the recommended studies and a biological assessment of the proposed projects have been completed.

Note: the temporary stairs at the north end of Meadowbrook Railroad Bridge (\$19,000) and the parking lot and restrooms at the Christmas Tree Farm site (\$77,000) were both deleted from the project lists. The temporary stairs were funded with leftover monies from another Parks capital project, and since this master plan was transmitted, the Christmas Tree Farm site has been purchased by the City of Snoqualmie for ballfield development.
