1	A MOTION urging the Washington state Legislature to	
2	enact the Clean Water Act of 2010 as a means to fund	
3	needed projects to address stormwater pollution in King	
4	County and statewide.	
5	WHEREAS, King County and other local governments are required by the feder	eral
6	Clean Water Act to control and clean up stormwater pollution within our jurisdictions,	
7	and	
8	WHEREAS, cleanup and restoration of Puget Sound is a local, statewide and	
9	national priority with the listing of Chinook salmon and orcas under the Endangered	
10	Species Act, and	
11	WHEREAS, contaminated stormwater runoff is the number one water pollution	1
12	problem in the state of Washington and in Puget Sound, and contaminated runoff from	
13	our roads and urban areas has harmed virtually urban creeks, streams and rivers in the	
14	state, and	
15	WHEREAS, cleaning up stormwater pollution is a daunting task because the	
16	sources of pollution are widespread and difficult to pinpoint, and the costs for complian	nce
17	and cleanup can be prohibitive, and	
18	WHEREAS, King County government is facing a structural budget gap in its	
19	general fund caused by increasing costs and declining revenues, threatening our	

20	government's ability to provide even basic mandated services including stormwater
21	pollution cleanup, and
22	WHEREAS, local governments and residents statewide are struggling with the
23	economic crisis, heightened unemployment, and the need to revive the economy and
24	create jobs, and
25	WHEREAS, the Clean Water Act of 2010: Working for Clean Water, which is
26	House Bill 3181 or Senate Bill 6851, as originally introduced would address these issues
27	by creating a funding source for projects that clean up storm water, creating jobs in the
28	construction industry and helping fund basic state services, and
29	WHEREAS, the Clean Water Act of 2010 as originally proposed would raise the
30	existing voter-approved Hazardous Substance Tax from seven-tenths of one percent to
31	two percent, raising \$225 million each year, allocating the bulk of the dollars to the state
32	general fund in the near term and transitioning the funding back to clean water purposes
33	over time, and
34	WHEREAS, because of the nexus between hazardous substances and the
35	pollution they produce, the Hazardous Substance Tax seems to be an appropriate vehicle
36	to pay for associated stormwater cleanup costs, and
37	WHEREAS, as originally proposed the Clean Water Act of 2010 would
38	accomplish the important goals of avoiding immediate cuts to core services, funding local
39	governments' obligations for stormwater pollution cleanup, creating construction jobs and
40	providing a clean water legacy we will be proud of for generations, and
41	WHEREAS, the bill was introduced in the state Legislature this session with
42	broad support locally and statewide from the Environmental Priorities Coalition,

Washington Association of Cities, Washington Association of Counties and the
Washington State Labor Council, as well as a coalition of education, health care and
social services groups unified behind solutions to maintain core public services;
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:
The metropolitan King County council urges the Washington state Legislature to
enact The Clean Water Act of 2010, which is House Bill 3181 or Senate Bill 6851, as a

- 49 means to fund needed projects to address stormwater pollution in King County and
- 50 statewide.
