13	WHEREAS, the county owns a	nd operates regional trails, regional recreational
14	facilities, regional natural areas, regior	al parks and local parks in unincorporated areas,
15	which are parts of the county's "open s	pace system," and
16	WHEREAS, the county's open	space system consists of approximately twenty-
17	eight thousand acres of parks, natural	areas and resource lands and more than one
18	hundred seventy-five miles of regional	trails, and
19	WHEREAS, a robust open spa	ce system contributes to a high quality of life, and

20	WHEREAS, such an open space system provides physical, social and mental
21	health benefits to individuals; economic opportunity through recreation and tourism;
22	economic growth for private businesses that must attract and retain skilled workers; and
23	environmental benefits and cultural resource protection through open space conservation,
24	and
25	WHEREAS, the open space system provides all these benefits to King County
26	residents and businesses, and
27	WHEREAS, for the benefit of all King County residents, in February 2019, the
28	executive transmitted to the council Proposed Ordinance 2019-0084, which would submit
29	to the qualified electors of King County a property tax levy on an August 2019 special
30	election ballot for the purpose of maintaining and operating King County's open space
31	system, including parks; acquiring lands; continuing to develop regional trails; repairing,
32	replacing and improving parks and trails in King County's towns and cities; funding
33	environmental education, maintenance and conservation programs at the Woodland Park
34	Zoo; and funding capital construction at the Seattle Aquarium;
35	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:
36	A. It is the intent of the council that levy proceeds be used for:
37	1. Metropolitan park district, town and city capital improvements and major
38	maintenance repair or replacement, as provided for in Ordinance XXXXX (Proposed
39	Ordinance 2019-0084), Section 4.E.2.e, and for open space acquisition and conservation
40	purposes, as provided for in Ordinance XXXXX (Proposed Ordinance 2019-0084),
41	Section 4.E.2.a, and that such uses be consistent with the capital project grant and open
42	space, natural lands and urban green space acquisition guidelines, which are included as

43 Attachment A to this motion;

A targeted equity grant program, consistent with the targeted equity grant
program guidelines, which are included as Attachment B to this motion;

3.a. Operations, projects and programs, and in such allocations, as provided in
Attachment C to this motion.

b. The moneys allocated to operations, projects and programs listed in 48 Attachment C to this motion may be modified where deemed advisable or necessary in 49 the judgment of the council; and implementation or completion of any project or program 50 listed in Attachment C to this motion will not be required if the council determines that it 51 has become inadvisable or impractical. The council will make such a determination 52 through action on an appropriations ordinance. Of the allocation for the Eastside Rail 53 Corridor, if any funding remains after completion of the projects planned as of the date of 54 adoption of this motion, or if any of this funding cannot be spent on those projects during 55 the levy period, remaining funding will be allocated to trail connections to the Eastside 56 Rail Corridor within the city of Renton. Of the allocation for the Lake to Sound Trail, if 57 any funding remains after completion of the projects planned as of the date of adoption of 58 this motion, or if any of this funding cannot be spent on those projects during the levy 59 period, remaining funding will be allocated to the Soos Creek Trail project. 60

c. The council requests that the department of natural resources and parks
report to the council annually by September 30 of each year, beginning in 2020, if it
anticipates requesting a reallocation of moneys for projects or programs listed in
Attachment C to this motion in the following year. The report should be filed in the form
of a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the council, who will retain

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66	the original and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief of
67	staff and the lead staff to the mobility and environment committee or its successor, and
68	the lead staff to the budget and fiscal management committee or its successor. The last
69	report should be filed by September 30, 2025;
70	4. Development and improvement of public pools, with eight million dollars
71	allocated to the Weyerhaeuser King County aquatic center. Use of the remaining levy
72	proceeds for development and improvement of public pools will be consistent with the
73	aquatic centers grant program guidelines, which are included as Attachment D to this
74	motion; and
75	5. Integrated floodplain management projects, consistent with the open space -
76	river corridor grant program guidelines, which are included as Attachment E to this
77	motion.
78	B.1. The department of natural resources and parks is requested to conduct
79	community outreach with the following communities:
80	a. The Redmond Ridge Residential Owners Association ("ROA") to develop a
81	strategy to mitigate impacts to ROA-owned trails from users of regional trails;
82	b. The Hobart and Fairwood communities to increase active recreation
83	opportunities; and
84	c. Communities surrounding Duvall park to identify potential partnerships and
85	other strategies to activate the space.
86	2. The council requests that the department of natural resources and parks
87	transmit to the council by December 31, 2020, a report on the community outreach efforts
88	and recommendations resulting from the community outreach efforts. The report should

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be filed in the form of a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the
council, who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all
councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead staff to the mobility and
environment committee or its successor, and the lead staff to the budget and fiscal
management committee or its successor.
C. Contracts between King County and towns and cities, as provided for in

Ordinance XXXXX (Proposed Ordinance 2019-0084), Section 6, should include a
requirement that towns and cities report to the department of natural resources and parks
and county councilmember offices when major milestones for parks capital projects, such
as groundbreaking and opening dates, are scheduled. Towns and cities should report at
least thirty days in advance of such major milestones.

D. All expenditures from Ordinance XXXXX (Proposed Ordinance 2019-0084) made in unincorporated areas of King County should only be made after consultation with the department of local services, in accordance with K.C.C. 2.16.055.

E. The department of natural resources and parks is requested to develop a plan to implement a youth conservation corps beginning in 2020. Funding for the youth conservation corps should be included in an appropriations ordinance, and the appropriations ordinance should be transmitted no later than December 31, 2019.

F.1. The council requests that the department of natural resources and parks
transmit to the council by January 31, 2020, a proposed ordinance to implement one or
more advisory committees to review and make recommendations on grant awards for the
grant programs described in Attachments A, B, D and E to this motion. The proposed
ordinance should also propose grant processes and protocols.

112	2. The committee or committees should include representatives from a variety
113	of stakeholders, such as cities, towns and metropolitan park districts and community
114	members and organizations.
115	3. The department of natural resources and parks should consult appropriately
116	with tribes in King County on parks levy expenditures, which may include review of
117	grant proposals or invitations to participate on advisory committees, or both.
118	4. The proposed ordinance should describe the responsibilities of the advisory
119	committee or committees, which may include consultation with the conservation futures
120	citizens oversight committee and the King County flood control district.
121	5. It is the intent of the council that grant awards as provided for in Attachments
122	A, B, D and E will begin in 2020. Final grant funding recommendations shall be made
123	by appropriation.
124	G.1. The council requests that the department of natural resources and parks
125	conduct an assessment of the feasibility and cost for the following projects:
126	a. the south extension of the Green to Cedar Rivers trail, including connections
127	to a Black Diamond open space area; and
128	b. closing the gaps in the Snoqualmie Valley Trail, including, but not limited
129	to the former Mill site in the city of Snoqualmie, and between the Issaquah Preston Trail
130	and Snoqualmie Valley Trail.
131	2. The department of natural resources and parks is requested to transmit the
132	assessment to the council by December 31, 2021. The assessment should be filed in the
133	form of a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the council, who will

- 134 retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief
- 135 of staff and the lead staff to the mobility and environment committee or its successor.

## 2 Acquisition Guidelines

4 Purpose

5 This document provides guidelines for the use of parks levy proceeds for capital project

- 6 grants and open space, natural lands and urban green space acquisitions. Parks levy
- 7 funding for open space, natural lands and urban green space acquisition is intended to

8 be used by King County, King County cities, towns and metropolitan park districts solely

- 9 for land acquisition. This includes lands located in opportunity or equity areas as defined
- in King County Code 26.12.003.

- 12 Eligible Entities
- 13 Entities eligible to receive funding include the following:
- 14 1. King County;
- 15 2. King County cities and towns;
- 16 3. Metropolitan park districts geographically located in King County.
- 17
- 18 Eligible Projects for King County
- Parks levy funding received by King County for open space, natural lands and urban green spaces acquisition can be used to acquire land for the following purposes:
- 1. Passive recreational uses (e.g. hiking, mountain biking, bird-watching, etc.);
- 22 2. Regional trails;
- 3. Open space lands except if the land is primarily an agricultural use; agriculture
- can be one of multiple uses allowed on lands funded by parks levy proceeds
- (e.g. community garden, pea patch), as long as the primary use allows public
   recreation and access.
- 27 Eligible Projects for King County cities, towns and metropolitan park districts
- 28 Parks levy funding received by King County cities, towns and metropolitan park districts
- for open space, natural lands and urban green spaces acquisition can be used to

30 acquire land or undertake capital projects for the following purposes:

- Active recreational uses (e.g. athletic fields, sports courts, ballfield turf projects,
   etc.)
- 2. Passive recreational uses (e.g. hiking, mountain biking, bird-watching, etc.);
- 34 3. Local trails;
- 4. Open space lands except if the land is primarily an agricultural use; agriculture
  can be one of multiple uses allowed on lands funded by parks levy proceeds
  (e.g. community garden, pea patch), as long as the primary use allows public
  recreation and access;

- 42 Other requirements for all entities
- 43 Open space, natural lands and urban green space acquisitions funded by the parks levy
- 44 proceeds must allow public access. To receive parks levy funds for eligible projects, the
- eligible entities will be required to enter into contracts with King County.

#### 1 Targeted Equity Grant Program Guidelines

- 2 <u>Overview</u>
- 3 Historically, many communities in King County have experienced inequitable and limited
- 4 regional investments in parks, open space, trails and recreation. There are an estimated
- 5 500,000 people in King County who live without proximity or access to parks, open
- 6 space and public recreation facilities. To help address these inequities, the parks levy
- 7 includes funding for a targeted equity grant program.
- 8 Purpose
- 9 The purpose of the targeted equity grant program is to increase access to and the use
- 10 of parks, open space and public recreation facilities in underserved communities. This
- program is consistent with and builds upon the goal of investing in community

12 partnership in the King County Equity and Social Justice Strategic Plan by helping to

- 13 build internal capacities of community-based partners.
- 14 Eligible Entities
- 15 Parks levy funding for the targeted equity grant program is intended to reach areas and
- individuals with the greatest need for access and recreation in both incorporated and
- 17 unincorporated areas. This includes:
- 18 1. King County towns and cities;
- 19 2. Tribes or tribal organizations serving residents of King County;
- 20 3. Non-profit organizations;
- 4. Small or emerging community organizations without a 501c3 status, through a
   partnership with a fiscal agent.
- 23 Eligible Geographic Areas and Communities
- 24 The targeted equity grant program will be eligible to entities that intend to increase
- access to and the use of parks, open space and public recreation facilities in the following areas:
- following areas:
- In equity areas as defined by King County Code 26.12.003, as may be amended;
   or
- 2. Programming or projects designed to increase access to or the use of parks and 30 recreation facilities by individuals with disabilities.

- 32 Eligible Projects
- 33 The targeted equity grant program may be used to fund the following:
- 1. Build capacity, and/or partnerships to develop and plan successful parks,
- 35 recreation, conservation and open space projects and programs;
- 2. Land acquisition for parks, open space and recreation purposes;
- 37 3. Capital projects and programming for parks, open space and recreation.

#### 39 Other Guidelines for all entities

40 All acquisitions, capital projects and programming funded by the parks levy proceeds

<sup>41</sup> must allow public access. To receive parks levy funds for eligible projects, the eligible

42 entities will be required to enter into contracts with King County.

#### 1 Aquatic Centers Grant Program Guidelines

- 3 Overview
- 4 For more than 50 years, King County communities have built public pools and aquatic
- 5 centers to improve access for residents to recreation, competition and education
- 6 opportunities. This grant program is intended to assist communities across all of King
- 7 County as our region grows and existing facilities become obsolete or reach capacity.
- 8 The Aquatic Centers grant program will provide funding opportunities for construction,
- 9 repair or expansion of new or existing aquatic centers in King County.
- 10
- 11 Eligible Entities
- 12 Parks levy funding for the Aquatic Centers Grant Program is intended to preserve or
- increase public access to aquatic centers in King County. Eligible entities include:
- 14 1. King County towns and cities;
- 15 2. Metropolitan Parks Districts;
- 16 3. School Districts;
- 17 4. Other public entities that own public aquatic facilities.
- 18
- 19 Eligible Projects
- 20 The Aquatic Centers grant program will fund projects necessary to the operation and
- construction of aquatic centers. The grant program will make funds available for the
- 22 following expenses:
- Planning or feasibility studies related to development of a publicly-owned aquatic facility;
- 25 2. Land purchase;
- 26 3. Pre-construction;
- 27 **4**. Design;
- 28 5. Construction;
- 29 6. Renovation;

- 35 Other Guidelines for all entities
- 36 All facilities receiving funding from the Aquatic Centers grant program must allow
- 37 regular public access. There is no minimum for capital requests. Capital grants for new
- aquatic centers are capped at \$5,000,000 or 25% of a facility's total cost, whichever is
- lower. Capital grants for existing facilities are capped at \$5,000,000 and grants from \$1
- \$100,000 can provide up to 100% of a projects total cost, grants from \$100,001 -
- 41 \$2,000,000 can provide no more than 50% of a project's total cost and grants from

- 42 \$2,000,001 \$5,000,000 can provide no more than 25% of a projects total cost. If a
- 43 facility serves multiple purposes, to calculate project cost, only infrastructure necessary
- 44 for an aquatic center may be included.
- Grants up to \$100,000 may be awarded to support planning or feasibility studies related
  to development of a publicly-owned aquatic facility.
- To receive parks levy funds for eligible projects, the eligible entities will be required to enter into contracts with King County.
- 49 All grant awards should make clear that King County assumes no role or funding
- 50 obligation for the ongoing operations, maintenance or completion of aquatic facilities,

- 1 Open Space River Corridors Grant Program
- 2
- 3 <u>Overview</u>
- 4 A grant program designed to provide funding for habitat restoration, open space and recreation in river
- 5 corridors. The purpose is to incentivize projects that will integrate multiple attributes of projects inside
- 6 river corridors such as flood control, habitat, passive recreation and trails.
- 7
- 8 Eligible Entities
- 9 Parks levy funding for the Open Space River Corridors grant program is intended to reach areas with the
- 10 greatest need for habitat restoration and/or recreation within river corridors in King County. Eligible
- 11 entities shall include:
- 12 1. King County towns and cities;
- 13 2. Tribes or tribal organizations serving residents of King County;
- 14 3. Port districts;
- 15 4. Flood control zone districts;
- 16 5. Flood control and diking and drainage districts;
- 17 6. Conservation districts;
- 18 7. Non-profit organizations; and,
- 19 8. Salmon recovery forums (i.e., WRIAs 7, 8, 9, 10).

- 21 Eligible Projects
- 22 An Open Space River Corridors grant program will fund as elements of flood hazard reduction
- 23 projects: open space acquisition, ecosystem restoration and/or recreation projects.
- 24 Eligible activities for the grant program include:
- **25** 1. Pre-construction (e.g., planning);
- 26 2. Feasibility and design;
- 27 3. Construction;
  - 4. Design and construction combined;
  - 5. Land acquisition (purchase or easement);

32 Other Guidelines for all entities

33 All acquisitions, capital projects and programming funded by the parks levy proceeds must allow public

access. To receive parks levy funds for eligible projects, the eligible entities will be required to enter into

- 35 contracts with King County.
- 36 Funding shall not be provided to fund environmental mitigation required by law or by permit or to
- supplant open space acquisition, habitat restoration or recreation already budgeted for by the grantapplicant.
- 39 A priority shall be placed on river corridors with threatened or endangered species and/or where
- 40 improvements contribute to Puget Sound Orca recovery.
