1	A MOTION requesting that the executive develop a report	
2	with recommendations for adding requirements related to	
3	human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation	
4	awareness training and testing for for-hire drivers.	
5	WHEREAS, victims of human trafficking, where persons profit from the cont	rol
6	and exploitation of others and as defined under federal and state law, includes sex	
7	trafficking where a person is induced to perform a commercial sex act by force, fraud	l,
8	coercion or in which the person induced to perform such an act is under age eighteen	and
9	labor trafficking where a person is forced into different forms of "labor or services,	
10	through the use of force, fraud or coercion, for the purposes of subjecting that person to	
11	involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage or slavery," such as domestic workers hel	d in
12	a home or farm workers forced to labor against their will, and	
13	WHEREAS, human trafficking is considered to be one of the fastest-growing	
14	criminal industries in the world, with human trafficking and commercial sexual	
15	exploitation having been identified as serious crime problems in King County, in	
16	Washington state and worldwide, and	
17	WHEREAS, Washington was the first state to criminalize human trafficking i	n
18	2003. Washington state has some of the most comprehensive laws critical to the figh	t
19	against human trafficking, punishing traffickers and supporting survivors, and is rated	1

most outstanding by the National Human Trafficking Resource Center's Polaris Project, 20 and 21 WHEREAS, the 2008 Report of the Washington Task Force against the 22 Trafficking of Human Persons recommended among its urgent priorities the need to: 23 educate Washington communities about human trafficking; provide support to implement 24 community-driven antitrafficking strategies, including primary prevention efforts; and 25 help victims escape their situations by making one-on-one contact with people who may 26 be in trafficking situations, and 27 WHEREAS, the King County Metro transit department participates in the Safe 28 Place program to assist at-risk youth in finding support services, and public information 29 about human trafficking to educate the public about human trafficking and inform victims 30 about resources available to them, simultaneously addressing the needs of individual 31 victims of trafficking are in need of services and protection, and 32 WHEREAS, King County regulates taxicabs, for-hire, and transportation network 33 companies, vehicles and drivers. The regulations are intended to ensure that customers 34 can use these transportation options in a safe manner, and 35 WHEREAS, in 1995, King County entered into an interlocal agreement with the 36 city of Seattle, whereby King County manages all for-hire driver licensing functions for 37 both jurisdictions. In addition, the county has interlocal service agreements with sixteen 38 cities and the Port of Seattle to provide all for-hire transportation regulatory services. 39 WHEREAS, as required by K.C.C 6.64.070, all new for-hire driver applicants are 40 required to complete driver training and pass the for-hire driver examination. The 41 prospective drivers are tested on fare determination, driver-passenger relations, driver 42

43	conduct, ability to understand oral and written directions, vehicle safety requirements,
44	driver regulations, emergency procedures, geographic knowledge of the county and
45	personal safety equipment, and
46	WHEREAS, in 2017 there were 2,453 taxi and for-hire drivers licensed and a
47	further 27,842 transportation network company drivers that received permits from the
48	county, and in 2017 these drivers transported passengers on nearly 25 million trips
49	countywide, and
50	WHEREAS, there are significant federal, state and local resources, including
51	those from the private sector, related to training regarding the identification of human
52	trafficking and commercially sexually exploited victims and survivors. Further, some
53	transportation network companies are voluntarily providing training to their drivers
54	regarding trafficking;
55	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:
56	A. The executive is requested to develop or acquire a proposed curriculum for
57	for-hire drivers as part of the required driver training for a for-hire license in King
58	County. The executive should examine existing resources for training materials to help
59	increase awareness and educate drivers on the indicators of human trafficking and
60	commercial sexual exploitation, the identification of human trafficking and commercially
61	sexually exploited victims and how to report human trafficking to the appropriate local
62	authorities to protect victims and survivors.
63	B. The training program should be focus on three goals:
64	1. Raising driver awareness about the nature of human trafficking, how and
65	where it occurs locally and how to prevent and stop it;

- 2. Helping drivers identify potential victims and survivors; and
- 3. Providing drivers with information on how victims and survivors might gain access to services.
- C. The executive shall seek to use existing successful strategies for anti-human-trafficking education and training materials already available from federal, state and county agencies. In addition, the executive should review any available training materials developed for human trafficking awareness by companies from the private sector, especially any materials that have been developed by transportation network companies or any other company that provides transport services to passengers.
- D. The development of recommended training options for drivers should be done in collaboration with subject matter experts, such as national, state and local advocacy groups; the transit department; the department of community and human services; the city of Seattle, the Port of Seattle and public health Seattle & King County. The King County prosecuting attorney's office and the King County superior court are encouraged to review the proposed education materials and curriculum.
- E. The human trafficking public information materials used in the education and training curriculum shall be accessible in multiple languages and should include contact information for the National Human Trafficking Resource Center Hotline.
- F. The executive should evaluate these materials and make recommendations for a plan for a proposed training program for drivers, recommendations on how the drivers will be tested on the content of the education materials and an estimate of the costs and other resources necessary to implement the training and examination requirements. The executive should also include a description of how for-hire drivers with existing licenses

- 89 could receive this training.
- G. The executive is requested to transmit to the council by April 1, 2020, a report
- 91 with recommendations for human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation
- 92 awareness training and testing for for-hire drivers, as required by this motion, in the form

- of a paper original and an electronic copy filed with the clerk of the council, who shall
- retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers.
