2 ORDINANCE NO. 3407 77-843

3 AN ORDINANCE relating to Forward Thrust Park  
4 Resolution No. 34571; authorizing the submittal  
5 to the voters of proposals by the City of  
6 Seattle requesting the termination of certain  
7 projects and addition of other park improvement  
8 projects from the bond funds allocated to the  
9 City of Seattle.

10 PREAMBLE:

11 King County Resolution No. 34571 (hereinafter  
12 "Resolution") was adopted by the Board of County Commissioners  
13 (now the King County Council and the King County Executive)  
14 on December 18, 1967 and is commonly referred to as the  
15 Forward Thrust Park Resolution.

16 This Resolution was approved by the voters of King  
17 County on the 13th day of February, 1968. The voters authorized  
18 the issuance of general obligation bonds for the purpose of  
19 financing, acquiring, development and improvement of public  
20 park and recreation facilities within King County for the  
21 general benefit of all the residents of the County.

22 Public park and recreation facilities as contemplated  
23 by the Resolution and defined therein mean any land, interest  
24 in land and facilities thereon within the County set aside for  
25 public park, recreational, green belt, arboretum, historic,  
26 scenic, viewpoint, aesthetic, ornamental or natural resource  
27 preservation purposes.

28 Section 3 of the Resolution assigned to cities,  
29 towns and King County projects and funds for such projects to  
30 be accomplished by such governmental agencies. The Seattle City  
31 Council passed Resolution No. 25640 (hereinafter "City Resolution")  
32 on September 21, 1977 and forwarded it to the King County  
33 Council for appropriate action. This City Resolution reflects

1 the desires of the City of Seattle (hereinafter "City") to  
2 revise the Resolution by terminating certain Resolution projects  
3 originally assigned to it, expanding the scope of existing projects  
4 and adding projects not cited in the original Resolution,  
5 both subject to the approval of the qualified electors of King  
6 County. This City Resolution, read together with the City Comp-  
7 troller File Nos. 285469 and 285390, which have been certified by  
8 the Comptroller and City Clerk, describe projects desired by the  
9 City to be terminated or transferred and projects on which funds  
10 made available by the termination of such projects shall be spent.

11 This City Resolution requests the King County Council  
12 to find that acquisition and improvement of the additional  
13 projects and expansion of existing projects identified in Section 2  
14 of the City Resolution is a County purpose and to take such  
15 action as is appropriate to place those terminations and additions  
16 or expansions before the voters of King County.

17 The Resolution provides that the Legislative Authority  
18 of the Governmental Agency to which a project is assigned has the  
19 sole authority to make findings and to determine if any specific  
20 project may be deleted within the guidelines of and pursuant to  
21 Section 5 of the Resolution. The County Council, therefore, makes  
22 no finding nor by the passage of this Ordinance, expresses any  
23 view on the issue of which City project, if any, set forth in  
24 Section 1 of this Ordinance could be deleted by the Legislative  
25 Authority of the City pursuant to Section 5 of the Resolution or  
26 which projects, if any, could be deleted only with voter approval.

27 The King County Council in accordance with the request  
28 of the City, desires to set forth those projects which the City  
29 seeks to terminate and those additional projects which the City  
30

1 desires to accomplish from the bond proceeds of the Resolution to  
2 become available from such terminations if approved by the voters  
3 of King County.

4 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

5 SECTION 1. Project Terminations. Section 1 of the City  
6 Resolution made findings that the following Resolution projects  
7 assigned to the City,

8 . . . are no longer practiced, useful or  
9 desirable and that authority to implement  
10 said projects should be terminated or  
11 reduced in scope, as indicated, upon  
12 approval by the qualified electors of  
13 King County. . . because of changed  
14 conditions, including but not limited to  
15 community opposition to or lack of  
16 community support for certain of such  
17 projects, adjustments to jurisdictional  
18 responsibilities, financial impact,  
19 excessive energy consumption, changes in  
20 demography, difficulties encountered in  
21 locating facilities, changed and changing  
22 public policy and attitudes and other  
23 changed conditions

24 and the City desires to be relieved of the obligation to accomplish  
25 such projects (descriptions following are those appearing in  
26 Section 3 of the original Resolution):

27 "E. Local and Neighborhood Parks . . .

31 Acquisition and development of approximately  
32 50 sites varying from city lot to several

21 SECTION 2. Additional Projects. Section 2 of the city

22 Resolution made findings that the following additional projects  
23 not listed in the Resolution or expansion to original projects are:

24 ". . . park, recreation and open space  
25 capital improvement projects. . ."

25 and

26 "are consistent with the plan set forth  
27 in Section 3 of King County Resolution  
28 34571 and the same, if acquired,  
29 constructed, installed, equipped,  
30 developed or otherwise improved, will  
31 be accessible to all residents of the  
32 City and King County and will provide  
33 additional opportunities for public  
recreation, aesthetic enjoyment, education  
and resource preservation for all such

1 residents and, subject to approval by the  
2 qualified electors of King County, herein-  
after provided for, the City should be  
3 authorized to accomplish such projects."

4 The dollar amounts indicated herein are approximate and represent  
5 the portion of Resolution bond proceeds committed to such projects  
6 by the City Resolution if approved by the voters of King County  
7 (project descriptions are those found in the City Resolution and  
8 City Comptroller File Nos. 285390 and 285469, the recommended  
9 1978-83 Capital Improvement Program of Seattle and Forward  
10 Thrust Reprogramming Final E.I.S, August, 1977, respectively):

11 B. Major Urban Parks \$ 500,000

12 (20) Magnuson Park - Phase II

13 This project provides for the Phase II  
14 development of Magnuson Park; including  
15 local park and playground aspects,  
16 development of the promontory bluff,  
17 Sand Point Head, additional accommodation  
18 for active recreation and additional  
19 landscaping and site restoration.

17 E. Local and Neighborhood Parks \$ 613,000

18 (1) Local Parks

19 This project provides for improvements to  
20 at least five local parks including Frink,  
21 Colman, Madison, Ravenna and Dr. Jose  
22 Rizal Parks, and acquisition of approxi-  
23 mately 2.48 acres of the Lake City Sewage  
24 Treatment Plant site. Development will  
include bridge improvements at Frink and  
Colman Parks, a play area at Madison Park,  
general rehabilitation and improvements to  
Ravenna Park, and development of a viewpoint  
at Dr. Jose Rizal Park.

25 H. Playgrounds, Playfields and Fieldhouses

26 (1) Playgrounds \$ 153,000

27 This project provides for improvements to  
28 Beacon Hill, Lakewood, University and other  
29 playgrounds. Improvements to Beacon Hill  
30 will include rehabilitation of the field  
31 and possible lighting improvements; and  
32 rehabilitation of the field and improvements  
33 to the play equipment, paths and landscaping  
at University; improvements at Lakewood will  
include wing fences, backstops and play  
equipment.

1 (2) Playfields \$ 924,000

2 This project provides for improvements to  
3 Jefferson, Bitterlake, Dahl, Meadowbrook,  
4 Georgetown and Broadway and other Playfields.  
5 Improvements will include installation of  
6 new surfaces, new irrigation and drainage  
7 at Jefferson; installation of a new surface  
8 and rehabilitation of the irrigation system  
9 at Bitterlake; installation of a new surface  
10 on #3 and #4 fields and adding an additional  
11 field with lighting at Dahl; installation of  
12 a new surface at Meadowbrook; installation of  
13 a new surface with irrigation and drainage at  
14 Georgetown; and development of children's  
15 play equipment and structures at Broadway.

16 (3) Fieldhouses \$2,008,000

17 This project will provide for improvements  
18 to existing community centers and related  
19 facilities, to increase their capacity,  
20 service life and operational efficiency.  
21 Centers to be considered for improvements  
22 include Laurelhurst, Loyal Heights, Ballard,  
23 South Park, Hiawatha, and Langston Hughes  
24 Cultural Arts Center and others. Security  
25 barriers and other security improvements  
26 will be made at certain school/park joint  
27 use facilities.

28 A multi-purpose gymnasium and support spaces  
29 will be added at Magnolia and a new supple-  
30 mental community center will be constructed  
31 at Delridge.

32 I. Recreation Facilities

33 (2) Camp Long Improvements \$ 113,000

34 Project is intended to provide handicapped  
35 access and will include curb cuts, wheelchair  
36 ramps, modifications to doorways, restroom  
37 fixtures, handrails, etc.

38 (6) Tennis Courts \$ 694,000

39 This project provides for the design and  
40 development of approximately 12 additional  
41 new tennis courts, new High Intensity  
42 Discharge floodlighting systems, rehabili-  
43 tation of existing lighting systems to be  
44 compatible with the new systems, and  
45 rehabilitation and resurfacing of existing  
46 courts. Sites include Riverview, Alki  
47 Playground, Washington Park, Laurelhurst,  
48 Rainier Beach, Rainier Playfield, Rogers  
49 Playground, Rodgers Park, Magnolia Playfield,  
50 Hiawatha, Delridge Playfield and University  
51 Playground.

- 1 (6) Seattle Tennis Center Development  
2 and Preliminary Design Study \$ 20,000

3 Project is third phase of further physical  
4 development (additional indoor and outdoor  
5 tennis courts) of Center, including explora-  
6 tion of feasibility of concessionaire  
7 development and operation, among other  
8 funding options. City has already acquired  
9 additional land by grant from United States  
10 Government and through street vacations.  
11 This would be expansion of existing Forward  
12 Thrust facility (Section 3.I.(6), King  
13 County Resolution 34571).

- 14 (7) Swimming Pool Improvements \$ 438,000

15 This project involves a variety of improve-  
16 ments and upgrading of Seattle's swimming  
17 pools to make these existing aquatic  
18 facilities more energy efficient, to reduce  
19 ongoing maintenance and operation costs and  
20 to insure their continued effective operation.  
21 Pools included for improvements are: Ballard,  
22 Evans, Evers, Madison, Meadowbrook, Queen  
23 Anne, and Colman.

- 24 (12) Sand Point Boating Facility \$ 375,000

25 This project provides for the development  
26 of a general all purpose boating facility  
27 at Sand Point. It would accommodate an  
28 expansion of existing facilities to take  
29 advantage of the extensive waterfront and  
30 its potential for a variety of boating  
31 programs.

- 32 (14) West Seattle Golf Course -  
33 Additional Development \$ 20,000

This project expands the original Forward  
Thrust Project (Section 3.I.(14), King  
County Resolution 34571) by which the  
City has already acquired additional  
lands. The project includes the explora-  
tion of the feasibility of concessionaire  
development and operation among other  
funding options for the further physical  
development (additional 9 holes) to the  
golf course.

L. Special Facilities

- (2) Seattle Aquarium \$ 623,000

This project will offset expenses already  
incurred in completing the Seattle Aquarium.



1 (7) Service Buildings \$ 150,000

2 This project provides for construction  
3 of prefabricated metal equipment storage  
4 buildings on concrete footings and floors  
5 at Lincoln Park, Washington Park and  
6 Discovery Park. These will allow covered  
7 storage for equipment and supplies now  
8 left outside.

9 SECTION 3. Capital Purpose and Project Life. The City  
10 Resolution provided that bond proceeds from the Resolution which  
11 will be available for additional or expanded projects as a  
12 result of the proposed terminations "shall be used for no other  
13 than a capital purpose" and

14 "that the life of the park, recreation and  
15 open space capital improvement projects set  
16 forth in Section 2 hereof is hereby declared,  
17 as near as practicable, to be forty (40) years."

18 SECTION 4. Emergency Finding/Request for County  
19 Vote. The City Resolution also finds,

20 "that an urgent need exists for the  
21 improvements designated in Section 2  
22 hereof and it is hereby declared that  
23 an emergency exists requiring submission  
24 to the qualified electors of King County  
25 of a proposition authorizing the modifi-  
26 cation of the provisions of Section 3 of  
27 King County Resolution 34571 as indicated  
28 herein and the Legislative Authority of  
29 King County is hereby requested also to  
30 make such a finding; the City hereby also  
31 requests the Legislative Authority of King  
32 County to determine that accomplishment of  
33 the additional projects identified in  
34 Section 2 hereof is a County purpose and  
35 to take such action as may be appropriate  
36 to place before the qualified electors of  
37 King County a proposition authorizing  
38 elimination of those projects identified  
39 in Section 1 hereof from the plan set forth  
40 in Section 3 of King County Resolution 34571  
41 and adding those projects identified in  
42 Section 2 hereof to such plan, all at a  
43 special election which the City further  
44 requests be held therein on November 8,  
45 1977 in conjunction with the municipal  
46 general election, or as soon thereafter  
47 as possible."

48 SECTION 5. Findings. The King County Council hereby  
49 finds and declares that the proposed Resolution revisions of project

1 terminations and additions or expansions set forth in Sections 1  
2 and 2 hereof respectively to be:

3 (a) for the health, welfare, benefit and  
4 safety of the people of King County and is  
a strictly County purpose;

5 (b) for the acquisition, construction,  
6 development and improvement of Public  
7 Park and Recreation facilities in King  
County and as such is consistent with  
the Resolution;

8 (c) for a capital purpose, the life of  
9 the improvements to be acquired or con-  
10 structed estimated to be as nearly as  
practicable, not less than forty years;

11 (d) for facilities which will constitute  
12 a necessary system of public park and  
recreation facilities for the County and  
its residents; and

13 (e) for facilities acquired or developed  
14 which will be available to and be of  
15 general benefit to all the residents of  
the County.

16 SECTION 6. Revised Plan of Park and Recreation Facilities.

17 The King County Council hereby adopts the following revisions to  
18 Section 3 of the Resolution subject to the approval thereof by  
19 the voters of King County in accordance with the requirements of  
20 the Constitution and laws of the state of Washington:

21 A. The authority of the City to acquire, develop  
22 and improve the following described projects as  
23 designated in Section 3 of King County Resolution  
24 34571 is hereby in part terminated as specified  
25 herein:

22 SECTION 7. Submittal to King County Voters. It is  
23 hereby found and declared that an emergency exists requiring  
24 submission to the qualified electors of King County at a special

EXHIBIT A TO KING COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 340.7

AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT

In consideration of the mutual covenants herein, King County (hereinafter called the "County") and the City of Seattle (hereinafter called the "City") agree as follows:

1. The County shall deliver to the City in the ordinary course of business after receipt of the proceeds of each series of general obligation bonds of the County contemplated to be issued pursuant to Resolution No. 34571 of the County as revised on November 8, 1977, the full amount of cash allocated to the City out of such proceeds by said Resolution revision.

2. The City shall hold said money in trust and shall faithfully apply same to the purposes authorized in said the revision to Section 3 of Resolution No. 34571 in the manner and subject to the conditions provided in said resolution; shall operate and maintain all facilities acquired, constructed, developed or improved with said money; shall defend and save the County harmless from any claim of damage resulting from the acquisition, construction, development, improvement, operation, maintenance, repair, replacement or public use of such facilities, and shall perform or comply with all conditions of said Resolution No. 34571 contemplated by said resolution to be performed or complied with by agencies to which the proceeds of bonds issued pursuant to such resolution have been allocated and delivered.

3. The County shall conduct or cause to be conducted an audit or audits of the City's use of bond proceeds delivered to the City hereunder.
