ORDINANCE NO. 7894

AN ORDINANCE establishing a Water Utility  
Coordinating Committee for the East King  
County Critical Water Supply Service Area.

PREAMBLE:

Pursuant to RCW 70.116, the Preliminary Assessment of Water  
Supply and Fire Issues in King County designates East King  
County a Critical Water Supply Service Area, hereinafter  
referred to as CWSSA.

RCW 70.116 requires establishment of a Water Utility  
Coordinating Committee to establish the boundaries of the  
CWSSA and to prepare a Coordinated Water System Plan.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:

SECTION 1. A Water Utility Coordinating Committee for the  
East King County CWSSA is hereby established for the purpose of  
implementing the Public Water Systems Coordination Act of 1977 by  
preparing a Coordinated Water Supply Plan.

SECTION 2. The Committee shall consist of representatives  
from the following agencies:

25 And all other purveyors with fifty or more service connections.  
26 Each of the listed agencies shall appoint a member and an  
27 alternate to the committee. Appointed members shall continue to  
28 serve until replaced by the appointing authority in accordance  
29 with the by-laws of the committee.  
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1           SECTION 3. A. At the first meeting of the committee, a  
2 chairperson and rules for conducting business shall be determined  
3 by consensus.

4           B. Within six months of its establishment, the committee  
5 shall be responsible for developing and recommending specific  
6 external critical water supply service area boundaries to the  
7 county council in the manner prescribed in WAC 248-56-600.

8           C. The committee may determine, through its by-laws, whether  
9 to divide itself into sub-committees in order to more efficiently  
10 accommodate the large size of the area and complexity of issues  
11 involved. If such action is taken, a steering committee comprised  
12 of, as a minimum, the committee chair, chairs of each  
13 subcommittee, and representatives of King County, DSHS, and  
14 Seattle Water Department shall also be established. Upon approval  
15 of the external boundaries, members who are excluded from the  
16 approved area may be dropped from the committee, or retained as  
17 non-voting members at their discretion.

18           D. Following the establishment of the external boundaries,  
19 the committee shall be responsible for developing a coordinated  
20 water system plan for the critical water supply service area in  
21 accordance with the procedures provided in WAC 248-56-740. On  
22 completion of the plan, the committee shall submit the plan to the  
23 Washington State Department of Social and Health Services via King  
24 County which shall conduct the local review required by law. The  
25 plan shall be submitted within eighteen months of the  
26 establishment of the committee.

27           E. The coordinated water system plan and external critical  
28 water supply service area boundaries shall be reviewed and updated  
29 as appropriate by the committee at a minimum of every five years,  
30 or sooner if the committee deems it necessary, as prescribed in  
31 WAC 248-56-760.

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SECTION 4. The Water Utility Coordinating Committee shall be terminated effective January 1, 1994 unless specifically extended by ordinance.
