Since its incorporation as a city in 1993, Burien has been busy defining and redesigning itself as a vibrant King County city. A 100-year-old community with a rich heritage, its citizens value the city as a friendly community with well-established neighborhoods and a small-town atmosphere, with thriving business areas including ethnic restaurants, bed and breakfasts, and an attractive, customer-friendly city center. Located on Puget Sound and just south of Seattle, Burien is a beautiful city that offers spectacular views and places to walk.

Burien's unique combination of parks, recreation, and cultural opportunities and facilities makes it a community where more and more people choose to live, work and play. Home to over 31,000 people of diverse cultures, Burien retains the friendly atmosphere of a small town. Residents are connected to the community, and friends and business associates gather at small cafes or delis to discuss local events. Many business owners are on a first-name basis with their customers. This feeling of connection makes Burien an attractive place to visit, work, live and raise a family. Located twenty minutes from downtown Seattle and ten minutes from Sea-Tac Airport, Burien provides easy access to a wide range of cultural, recreational and shopping amenities, as well as major transportation facilities. With over six miles of Puget Sound waterfront and over 300 acres of parks and open space, it also maintains a strong commitment to the environment and quality of life opportunities.

An active arts community and a variety of special events make Burien a great place to live, work and do business. Whether you are resident, passing through, or stopping by to visit, you will discover why Burien is a city that holds many wonderful places to go and things to do just waiting to be discovered. Offering a diverse array of cuisine in the area, Burien's many restaurants are exceptional. Burien also offers a wide variety of arts and entertainment, festivals and events. Take in a performance at Highline Performing Arts Center, Burien Little Theater, or enjoy one of many outdoor concerts at Lake Burien School Memorial Park in the summer. Burien's summer Farmers Market and other community events are held in Town Square Park. In June, Burien citizens gather to celebrate the Strawberry Festival at Burien Community Center Park, and the city marks the holidays with several events downtown.

Burien's parks, open space and trails include several regional public space amenities for passive and active recreation. Seahurst Park, a beautiful 169-acre park with nearly a mile of Puget Sound waterfront and several miles of gravel trails, is Burien's most popular park. With striking views of Puget Sound and the Olympic Mountains drawing thousands of visitors each year, the park is considered by many to be Burien's most beautiful natural space and is one of the largest regional parks on Puget Sound. Its natural beach is a favorite for marine environment and beach naturalists.

In contrast, Des Moines Memorial Park is considered by many to be the smallest park in King County. Located on Des Moines Memorial Way it is the location of a memorial wall honoring the soldiers of World War I and nearly 1,000 elm trees planted along this road in the early 1900s. Dedicated to the memory of those who served our nation so long ago, you can learn more at www.roadofremembrance.org. Burien's Moshier Park, located next to Highline High School, provides area softball and soccer teams a place to play. Burien Community Center Park is home to an award-winning skatepark that is the focus of youthful energy and daring-do throughout the year. Eagle Landing Park, with its gravel trail and staircase that leads to a pristine beach, provides exercise walkers and naturalists an opportunity to discover the unique environment of this area. Burien offers a great quality of life, a strong sense of community, and wonderful recreational opportunities for people of all ages. **Burien—Discover it today!**

SeaTac The Hospitality City

SeaTac is a young city with a small town atmosphere, where residents take pride in attractive neighborhoods, well-maintained parks, and plentiful views of Mount Rainier. Only fifteen minutes from Seattle, SeaTac is located at the crossroads of the region's most important transportation links. Home to more than 25,000 residents, the connection between SeaTac and the global community is growing stronger every day. More and more people from around the world are choosing to make SeaTac their home.

SeaTac prides itself on the open space and recreational programs provided for its citizens. There are currently eight parks in the city offering a wide variety of recreational activities. Angle Lake Park, a vibrant 10-acre waterfront park with towering fir trees, is a favorite destination for swimming, picnicking, fishing, and enjoying the spectacular view of Mount Rainier. Each summer cultural opportunities are offered on a grassy slope of the park. Music in the Park Concerts Series and Theatre in the Park performances are highlighted on a beautifully designed performing stage with Angle Lake as the backdrop.

SeaTac is truly an international city. Citizens and local businesses can celebrate the cultural diversity of the community by participating in the International Festival. The festival is held the last full weekend in June each year at Angle Lake Park.

Valley Ridge Park, a 21-acre park located in the center of the City, is a popular spot for sports enthusiasts. Recreational opportunities abound including baseball/softball, soccer, tennis, hockey, basketball, and a half-mile lighted walking path. The children's play equipment features areas for both school-age and preschool kids, allowing them both age appropriate play opportunities. Skateboarders show their moves on 6,600 square feet of obstacles in the lighted skate park. A very popular event that takes place each June is the "Under the Lights" nighttime skateboard competition where skateboarders come to show their stuff.

Tukwila It Starts in Parks

Tukwila has been a place for people to gather for hundreds of years. Even before Tukwila incorporated as a city, the Duwamish Tribe named the area Tukwila which means "valley where the hazelnuts grow." Since those early days, Tukwila has continued to be a gathering spot. With its easy access to downtown Seattle, Sea-Tac Airport, the Tukwila Sounder commuter rail and Amtrak station, two interstate highways, Tukwila has grown to become a powerful engine for the regional economy. Today, Tukwila hosts over 2,000 businesses with more than 40,000 employees working in retail, manufacturing, finance, technology and tourism.

Tukwila has many great businesses to visit. Westfield Southcenter Mall is expanding and will soon have a 16-screen movie theater, scores of great restaurants and everything you need within a short walk. The city is also home to many hotels, convenient restaurants, and dozens of fun activities. You can see aircraft history and Boeing's first building at the Museum of Flight, play soccer or softball at Starfire Sports Center, bowl until midnight at ACME Bowl, hit baseballs and play games at the Family Fun Center, golf at the 18-hole Foster Golf Links, or cycle the paved trails along the beautiful Green River.

Tukwila is also a fabulous place to live. Just ask one of our 17,900 residents. The heart and soul of this diverse community is the people who live in Tukwila's neighborhoods and enjoy its parks and gathering places. There is always something happening for people of all ages at the award-winning Tukwila Community Center with its gym, skateboard park, meeting rooms, fitness equipment, classes and activities. In Tukwila you will discover a beautiful park system with scenic picnic spots, playgrounds, trails for walking and biking, a 25-yard swimming pool and an 18-hole golf course with a new clubhouse and restaurant. Tukwila has three popular libraries and hosts the Rainier Symphony. And when the sun comes out, so do the festivals. There is a Wildlife Habitat Fair in May where Tukwila earned the distinction of becoming the first Wildlife Habitat community in the state. Enjoy the Family Fourth at Fort Dent on July 4th which includes fun and games for the whole family plus spectacular fireworks! The week of July 4th continues the Tukwila Days Festival with activities that include sports, art, games, crafts, food and a parade.

In 2008 Tukwila will celebrate its centennial and we hope you'll celebrate with us. So when you're thinking of a location to start a business, hold a meeting, gather your family, shop 'til you drop, or if you just want a great place to live, think Tukwila!

RENTON A Place to Be!

Located on the south shore of Lake Washington, Renton is a city offering spectacular views of the Olympics, Cascades, and Mount Rainier. The Cedar River and trail, which run through the heart of downtown, also offer an abundance of natural beauty. Renton offers a unique quality of life, a strong sense of community, and excellent recreational opportunities for everyone.

Renton boasts an extensive park, open space, and urban trails system that consists of 27 developed parks, the Maplewood Golf Course (an 18-hole, 190-acre, public golf course), 12.5 miles of trails that include a paved 4.5 mile trail along the Cedar River, and 732 acres of public open space for passive and active recreation.

Gene Coulon Memorial Beach Park, a beautiful 55-acre park with nearly 1.5 miles of Lake Washington waterfront, is the most popular City Park with 1.5 million visitors each year. The park was rated by The Seattle Times as one of the top five parks in the Seattle area for children.

Veteran's Memorial Park is showcased next to the History Museum and provides an excellent opportunity to honor and reflect on those who have served our nation.

Skateboarders find Liberty Park Skate Park both fun and challenging, offering 8,400 square feet of obstacles for varying degrees of ability. Another popular recreational opportunity is the city-operated Henry Moses Aquatic Center. It features waterslides, swimming pools, a wave pool, lazy river, and more.

Each summer the Piazza Park hosts a weekly Farmers Market. In July, Renton citizens gather to celebrate two major festivals—the Fourth of July at Gene Coulon Memorial Beach Park, and Renton River Days located in Liberty Park.



In December, Renton lights up the town with tree lighting celebrations and Clam Lights at Gene Coulon Memorial Beach Park.

The City has a community center, two neighborhood centers, a senior center, two City library branches, and a museum. Renton's unique combination of parks, recreation, and cultural opportunities and facilities make it a community where people choose to live, work, and play.

There are many wonderful things to do in Renton. Whether you enjoy dining in great restaurants, world-class parks for recreation, or unique places to shop—Renton has it all! Renton also offers a diverse array of arts and entertainment, festivals, and events. Take in a performance at Carco Theatre, Renton Civic Theater, Renton IKEA Performing Arts Center, or enjoy one of many outdoor concerts at Gene Coulon Memorial Beach Park in the summer.
